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
ABOUT

With 4,029 square miles, Big Island is the largest of the Hawaiian Islands and the largest in the United States. The county is politically divided into eight distinct regions, seven of which straddle the coastlines and slopes of the five central volcanoes. While each is distinct in character and microclimate, most of the Island's 200,000 residents are in the capital of Hilo on the east coast, and the town of Kona on the west. These two sister cities complement each other like night and day. Hilo is the wettest city in the U.S., its lush foliage in stark contrast to the hot semi-arid and sandy shores of Kona.




As you drive 20-minutes north of Ellison Onizuka Kona International Airport, you'll marvel at the rugged lava fields surrounding you. You may not see it from Queen Kaahumanu Highway, but the Kohala Coast is where you'll find some of the island's finest resorts. Nestled amongst the jet-black and rust-red lava rock fields, a result of eruptions from the island's volcanoes centuries ago, are green oases full of world-class accommodations, fine dining and some of Hawaii's best golf courses.





Kailua–Kona is one of two significant urban areas on Big Island and found on the edge of Hualalai volcano's slopes. Kona's excellent tropical semi-arid weather and closeness to the region's best beaches have made it the center of tourist activity. It is by far the liveliest area, offering full amenities and conveniences for those seeking a beach-oriented vacation.





Vast, rural and remote, the island of Hawaii's southernmost region, Kau, is a quiet area free of large hotels, resorts and golf courses. It's home to the small communities of Naalehu and Pahala, and one of the most famous beaches in the state—Punaluu Black Sand Beach. Kau is also home to most of Hawaii Volcanoes National Park and Kilauea, one of the world's most active volcanoes. It's a place of natural wonders where you can witness the growth of the island right before your eyes.






South of Hilo on the island of Hawaii's easternmost tip lies the Puna district and town of Pahoa, known for its free-spirited vibe. Many locals believe that Puna is Pele's workshop, where the volcano goddess continually creates and recreates the very land we live on. Indeed, this dynamic area stretches from Kilauea's summit east to the sea, including lava features, black-sand beaches and more natural wonders forged by the power of volcanoes.





The charming capital city of Hilo straddles a crescent-shaped bay, surrounded by lush tropical foliage. Hilo's natural surroundings are verdant green, blessed with dramatic waterfalls, fertile rainforests and blooming gardens. Hilo retains the laid-back spirit of a former fishing village and acts as a great hub to explore the rugged mountainous regions of the central Island. It is also home to Hilo International Airport and is a convenient stop on your way to Hawaii Volcanoes National Park, located 45 minutes south.






Located just north of Hilo on the northeastern side of the island of Hawaii, the Hamakua Coast is one of the most beautiful stretches of scenery on the island. With nearly 84 inches of rainfall a year, the region boasts lush tropical rainforests, stunning waterfalls and tranquil green valleys. For a memorable drive, take the Hamakua Heritage Corridor from Hilo to Waipio Valley Lookout. The heritage drive includes two of the island's most famous waterfalls—the 442-foot-high Akaka Falls and the 100-foot-tall Kahuna Falls.





The Island of Hawaii may not have as many beaches as its sister islands, but it makes up for that in diversity. Big Island flaunts multi-colored sands from pristine white to jet black. Shaped by dramatic volcanic activity, Hawaii offers vast resort shores, to wild and hidden sandy coves, well worth a journey. All this and more accounts for an idyllic sea, sand, and sun getaway where your only concern is what's on the menu next.






When you think about the perfect white sand beach in Hawaii, Mauna Kea is the one that fits to a tee. This golden coast gem presents shores of powdery talcum-like sand lined with palm trees, world-class restaurants, and amenities for the ultimate family outing.





Beyond the volcanic coastlines of Kohala lies a fantastic stretch of shore consistently ranking on international Top Ten Best Beaches lists. Hapuna is the island's most famous white sand beach, ideal for families and a wide range of water sports like kitesurfing and kiteboarding.





Kua Bay's Manini'owali beach is considered a contender for the island's "best white sand beach." It may be a tad out of the way, but the shore's crystal clear waters and ultra-soft sands make the trek worthwhile. Secluded and slim, keep your eyes open for turtles and dolphins!





Makalawena beach may not be the most accessible, but it surely does not disappoint once you reach its shores. Long stretches of shade from towering palms grace the incredibly white sands. Here, you're sure to lose the crowds. Located within the Kekaha Kai State Park, the calm waters provide incredible snorkeling opportunities between the lava rock outcropping stretching into the sea.





Kekaha Kai State Park reveals some stunning undeveloped shorelines if you're looking to round off a hiking adventure with a refreshing dip. Between three world-class beaches and a novel black-sand shore, the choice is yours. The park preserves the allure of this wild and wonderful area.





An extraordinary sight, Papakolea is one of only two green sand beaches in the United States. Pristine and wild, this beach is not serviced by any amenities, but its remarkable green crystal sand against vivid aquamarine water is absolutely enthralling. The beach is not an unlikely swimming spot when conditions permit.






A gem of the southeastern Ka'u coast, the Punaluu black sand beach is genuinely otherworldly. Unique pitch-black basaltic sands are the resting spots for some of Hawaii's most extraordinary creatures – giant green and Hawksbill sea turtles. The strong currents of these waters may not be ideal for swimming, but you'll be amazed at what you'll find on the shores.




ISAAC HALE PARK & POHOIKI BEACH

The black sands of Pohoiki beach at Isaac Hale park are a reminder of the tremendous power of nature. A 2018 volcanic eruption introduced 1.3 square miles of new land, with molten lava pouring into the central Pacific. The result? A fresh new layer of fine black sand. Isaac Hale Beach Park remains a diverse area in the lush eastern Puna district, notable for ocean thermal ponds and surfing.






On Big Island, there are few places quite as dramatic as the Pololu Valley beach. "Beach" is rather a misnomer since this is not a sunbather's paradise, but rather one of the world's most scenic areas – so beautiful that you'll have to catch your breath at first sight. Imagine a lush tropical forest enclosed by 500-foot cliffs. At Pololu, a black sand shore and large boulders that line it are swallowed by a stunning surf!






A majestic land sculpted by fire and born from the sea, Big Island's terrain is formed from the coalescence of six shield volcanoes. Hawaii has an astounding range of geographies, microclimates, and biodiversity, so this Island is far from reaching its final incarnation. Three of Big Island's volcanic peaks — Hualalai, Mauna Loa, and Kilauea — remain active. Few places offer the chance to witness the awe—inspiring terrestrial forces of destruction and creation, like Big Island. Offering outstanding hiking and sightseeing, no trip to the Island of Hawaii is truly complete without visiting these forbidding and fascinating volcanic areas.

Big Island's oldest volcano, Kohola, has long been dormant, its previous eruptions tracing back more than 65,000 years. Defined by a broad summit covered in trees, its ancient volcanic activities have been witnessed by the iconic cliffs of the Kohola shoreline. Kohola's previous debris avalanches have shaped Big Island's most natural sites, such as the Pololu valley.






Mahukona is Big Island's forgotten volcano, and its small peak was submerged by neighboring Kohola years ago. Discovered in 1987, Mahukona is evidence of the ongoing mystery and intrigue shrouding this fascinating Island.





The gargantuan Mauna Kea is the world's tallest mountain when measured from its base on the seafloor. It's estimated the most recent eruption occurred 4,000 years ago, earning Mauna Kea the title of a sleeping giant. Its 13,796-foot summit has made it arguably the world's best spot for stargazing. Home to one of the world's largest international observatories, Mauna Kea's bejeweled star-studded skies are immersed in a wondrous polar tundra.





The western slopes of the dormant Hualalai volcano make up the beachside oases of Big Island's Kona coast. Long dormant, its ancient lava streams are covered by those of nearby Mauna Loa. Hualalini's volcanic minerals make up the ash soil crucial for Kona's famous coffee plantations.





Mauna Loa, otherwise known as the world's largest volcano, is also among the world's most active, experiencing 33 eruptions since documentation began in 1843. The colossal shield volcano stands at an elevation of 13,677 feet above sea level, roughly a half-mile short of Mauna Kea, yet its terrain covers more than 50% of the Big Island's area.



KILAUEA

Kilauea is no stranger to the 24-hour news cycle as Hawaii's youngest and world's most active volcano. With the latest eruption, permanently reshaping the Island's terrain, tracing back to 2018, it is clear Kilauea is as active as ever. As Hawaii's only UNESCO heritage site, this volatile and fascinating peak, remains a top destination for hiking and aerial tours.





RESTAURANTS

The Kona coast is an epicenter of fine dining on par with the finest offerings of its sister islands. While Oahu may be known for fantastic modern fusion cuisine and Maui for its rustic farm—to—table ethos, Big Island is a paradise for meat lovers. The Island of Hawaii offers all the exotic colors and flair of Hawaiian regional cuisine with superior access to exceptional cuts of beef. A product of Big Island's historic "paniolo" cowboy culture, the rolling evergreen pastures of Waimea provide some of the world's finest grass—fed cattle. 
KONA HAWAIIAN QUILT MUSEUM

Discover the region's elaborate arts and crafts heritage through the lens of quilting! Presenting an incredible selection of mixed media and fiber art quilts, the Kona Quilt Museum presents works from a wide range of local designers and artisans. You can learn about the traditional art of making "kapa," trace a Hawaiian quilt pattern to take with you, and browse Hawaiian style and island-themed quilts for sale in the gallery.





Located in Hilo, this quaint art museum also operates as a cultural center, with a full itinerary of local programming offering workshops and classes for all ages. With a modest permanent collection showcasing local artists, the Hawaii Museum of Contemporary Art emphasizes temporary exhibits, offering patrons new experiences regularly.





Hilo's Lyman Museum is an immersive exhibit telling stories of the Hawaiian Islands and their peoples. This Smithsonian-affiliated institution reveals a plethora of priceless ancient artifacts and fine art. Discovering the intriguing histories of the ancient island peoples to the present day will give you an even deeper appreciation of this mystical land.





This nonprofit educational center has a mandate of supporting and perpetuating Hawaiian arts in the region. Situated within the majestic Volcanoes National Park, this charming gallery wrangles the dynamism and beauty of its surroundings for creative expression. A major cultural node on the island, you may find exceptional local creations here en route to an afternoon hike.





No matter what time of year you find yourself on Big Island, you can be sure of a local holiday, event, or celebration just around the corner. Whether you're here for a few days or more than a week, chances are you'll be swept up by some of the island's annual traditions, from the Merrie Monarch Festival to the annual Ironman Triathlon.





Big Island's Kona Coast provides a remarkable backdrop for the Ironman Triathlon. An extreme marathon celebrating the limits of human athleticism, the Ironman course runs through the barren lava fields to the open waters of Kaily-Kona Bay. The daunting 140-mile test of endurance has been hosted on Big Island since 1981.





The King Ka'u Coffee Festival celebrates the proud coffee cultivation heritage of Big Island's southern district. Two weeks of informative farm tours and brewing workshops allow festival–goers to savor the distinct flavors of Ka'u coffee. Held at the tail end of December, the weeks conclude with local music and Hula.






The annual Merrie Monarch Festival presents a whole week of Hawaiian cultural celebrations in Hilo. Festivities highlight aboriginal culture from song, craft, dance, and artwork and include a prestigious Hula competition. This annual event is credited for the renaissance of Hawaiian culture, guiding new generations, locally and beyond.







The Pololu lookout delivers the Island's most outstanding sunrise views. Domineering vistas are shown 490 feet above the Pololu valley, where lush valleys meet dramatic sea cliffs. Make sure to scout for Humpbacks in the distance if you're visiting during the winter months. From here, you may hike down to the famous black sand beach.




WAIPI'O VALLEY OVERLOOK

The Waipio Valley is one of the most beautiful and culturally significant sites on the island. This "Valley of the Kings" was the place King Kamehameha grew up and is a place of extraordinary tropical beauty. The valley is spread out before you from the lookout, with taro fields, waterfalls, and rivers.



MAUNA KEA SUMMIT

Big Island's roof, the summit of Mauna Kea, stands at 13,796 feet high. This natural wonder has many distinctions, from the tallest volcano on the island to the world's tallest mountain when measured from base to summit. A winning combination of isolation and incredible height above the clouds boasts access to the world's clearest skies. Mauna Kea's peak is the world's premier spot for studying the night sky, replete with a visitor's center and international observatories.





A fascinating spot for history buffs, this artificial island was built by King Kamehameha in 1812 as a temple honoring Lono, the god of fertility. The temple is located just off of Kona's Kamakahonu beach. The King's refuge and a place of ritual invocations, Ahu'ena Heiau, offers a rare glimpse into a genuinely interesting yet overlooked history.



LAVA VIEWING AT HAWAII VOLCANOES NATIONAL PARK

No visit to Big Island is complete without a lava viewing, and witness the tectonic forces that have given birth to the entire archipelago. There are plenty of guided tours available to accommodate shorter or more challenging outings stopping by Kilauea's famous Halema'uma'u crater and other sites.






Situated just off the Chain of Craters road, the Holei Sea Arch is an intriguing land formation standing 90 feet high. Shaped by lava flow and erosion, this is a famous pit stop on the way to Volcanoes National Park.





If you're anxious to hit the road, Big Island has some of the world's most scenic stretches of highway. Whether you're looking to coast along the oceanfront or have a bumpy 4X4 adventure, Big Island will deliver. Meander through dramatic landscapes and altitudes, and discover the island on your terms at your own pace. 

Short and sweet, the Pe'pe-ekeo road offers some of Big Island's most worthwhile detours. This 4-mile narrow winding road packs incredible beauty, meandering through lush canopies, quaint one-lane bridges, and stunning views of Onomea Bay. A few miles north of Hilo, there is no shortage of photo-ops in this corner of the Island made famous by the Botanical gardens and Akaka falls.






This spectacular winding road takes you through the glory of Hawaii Volcanoes National Park. Don't forget a pack of chewing gum because this path takes you to an altitude of 4000 feet to the summit of Kilauea before descending back to sea level. Marvel at the old lava crossings that have consumed previous roads, Chain of Craters Road is a motorist's dream.






If you're seeking an adventure, Saddle Road should be on your itinerary. This path conjoins East and West of the island through the mountainous interior. Drive past dried lava flows, otherworldly moonscapes, rainforests, and scalded deserts. The route has been much improved from when it was known as the most dangerous road in the state. Today it offers 54 miles of unadulterated adventure.






Of all the natural majesty in this corner of the world, it is no understatement to claim Big Island holds a considerable monopoly. In fact, four out of the five national parks in Hawaii are claimed by this island. 


PU'UHONUA O HONAUNAU NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK


HAWAII VOLCANOES NATIONAL PARK

Just 45 miles southwest of Hilo lies the world-famous Volcanoes National Park. A trip highlight, the park occupies an astounding 523 square miles or about 90% of the area of Oahu. Open 24 hours, here you may wonder at the glow of lava lakes, austere mountainscapes, and culturally significant historic sights. One-hundred and fifty miles of hiking trails weave through a dramatic terrain traversing volcanic craters, deserts, and rainforest.
