

THE HEART OF PARIS | 1ST ARRONDISSEMENT

The oldest and most central 1st and 2nd Arrondissements are the two smallest districts of Paris, the seat of royal power in France for centuries and the birthplace of the city. Home to the renowned Louvre Palace, the Right Bank's elegant 1st Arrondissement offers many iconic attractions, from the world-famous Musée du Louvre and the lush Jardin des Tuileries and Jardin du Palais Royal, to the contemporary Collection Pinault – Paris. And at the heart of the Seine, lies the Île de la Cité, whose centuries-old monuments have withstood the test of time. Most renowned of them all is the Notre Dame de Paris cathedral, the most visited monument in France, immortalized by Victor Hugo, and not to mention the Palais de Justice's crown jewel, the majestic Sainte-Chapelle, where the Crown of Thorns and other relics of Christ are kept.



THE HEART OF PARIS | 2ND ARRONDISSEMENT

Tucked away in the 2nd Arrondissement, a chic and serene area beloved by locals, is a traveler's haven with much to offer. From the renowned Notre Dame and the picturesque Seine-side museums, to the iconic Centre George Pompidou and the majestic Place des Victoires, lined with beautiful concave buildings, there is something here to awe and amaze. The area has recently been bustling with exciting new restaurants, such as Frenchie and Le Central, and sophisticated cocktail bars, such as Frenchie Bar a Vin, as well as gourmet shops like Legrand Filles et Fils, making it a chic spot in its own right. Take a tranquil stroll and discover the six roads that come together in the roundabout, making this underrated Parisian neighborhood a wonderful surprise.




THE MARAIS - UPPER MARAIS | 3RD ARRONDISSEMENT

The Marais encompasses the 3rd and 4th Arrondissements and is one of the oldest and most charming *quartiers* of the city. The arrondissement contains the northern, quieter part of the medieval district of Le Marais. Built over marshlands ("marais"), it was the favored neighborhood of the aristocracy from the 13th to the 17th centuries. Nowadays, you'll find trendy shops and thousands of Parisians out for Sunday brunch. It's also where you go for a bit of a stroll down the grassy path at the equilateral Place de Vosges, the first royal park in Paris open to the public. The 3rd Arrondissement, known as the Haut Marais (Upper Marais), is the best neighborhood for cafes and museums. It underwent a mid-2000s metamorphosis and today bursts with design ateliers and stylish cafes. Unmissable sights include the Musée National Picasso, in a mid-17th century private mansion, and the Musée Carnavalet, retelling the history of the French capital.




THE MARAIS - 4TH ARRONDISSEMENT

As opposed to the more suave Upper Marais, the Le Marais' more lively southern part contains the 4th Arrondissement. As for the 4th Arrondissement (quatrième), the district received a facelift of its own in the 1960s and '70s and remains one of Paris' most fashionable addresses. The multifaceted 4th Arrondissement is also home to thriving Jewish and LGBTQI+ communities and the iconic Centre Pompidou cultural center showcasing modern and contemporary art.



LATIN QUARTER (THE 5TH ARRONDISSEMENT)

Explore the 5th Arrondissement, the heart of the Latin Quarter of Paris. Home to narrow streets, captivating cultural sites, and a buzzing student atmosphere, the Latin Quarter takes its name from the Latin language used in educational institutions such as the prestigious Sorbonne. Stroll around and lose yourself in the hidden lanes between the Gardens of Luxembourg and the Pantheon. Here, you'll find a taste of Paris as it used to be - a relaxed and friendly place. The Latin Quarter is the most famous area of the city, a haven for second hand bookstores, art-deco cinemas, jazz clubs, and late-night bars. History buffs will be in their element with the Musée National du Moyen Âge showcasing medieval and Roman-era architecture, while Jardin des Plantes is home to several natural history museums. The domed Panthéon mausoleum houses the graves of some of France's most beloved luminaries. To truly get a sense of the Latin Quarter, wander towards the Pantheon, the center of student activities, and discover its lesser-known, charming medieval streets.




SAINT-GERMAIN-DES-PRÉS - 6TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The 6th Arrondissement of Paris is home to the legendary Saint-Germain-des-Prés, a veritable epicenter of Parisian culture and intellectual life. Boasting some of the most beautiful sights in the city, the neighborhood was a meeting point for French existentialists, Lost Generation Americans, and literary giants in the 19th and early 20th centuries. Here, Simone de Beauvoir and Sartre conversed with poets like Jacques Prevert, revolutionaries gathered around a Procope table, and painters like Delacroix and Manet drew inspiration. Commemorating this rich history, plaques mark the former homes of French literary and cultural icons. Nowadays, Saint-Germain-des-Prés is a dazzling gemstone of exquisite boutiques and restaurants, complete with the lush greenery of Jardin du Luxembourg – where children sail wooden boats on an octagonal pond.



EIFFEL TOWER - 7TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The 7th Arrondissement is home to some of the grand symbols of the city – Musée d'Orsay, the Musée Rodin's sculpture-filled mansion and rose garden, and the indigenous and folk-art museum, Musée du Quai Branly – Jacques Chirac. Manicured lawns front the central Hôtel des Invalides military complex containing Napoléon's tomb. To the west is Paris's emblematic Eiffel Tower. But if you look beyond those glittering facades, you'll find narrow, yet wealthy residential streets, tree-lined parks, the banks of the Seine, and the services Parisians need for their daily lives.



CHAMPS-ELYSÉES - 8TH ARRONDISSEMENT

Renowned around the world, the Champs–Elysées Avenue in Paris serves as the beating heart of the city, providing a place of appreciation for both Parisians and tourists. Drawing its name from Greek mythology, Champs–Elysées is said to be the final resting place for warriors. Its 2 kilometers stretch from Place de la Concorde to Place de L'Etoile and offers a picturesque view of Paris' chic districts. Adorned with renowned designer stores such as Louis Vuitton, Cartier and Guerlain, the Avenue des Champs–Elysées lures you in with its high–end boutiques. The 8th Arrondissement, home of luxury, museums and exclusive shopping, houses Parc Monceau and Place de la Concorde at one end, with the Arc de Triomphe at the other. Although the area around the renowned Champs–Elysées Avenue is teeming with tourists and shopping opportunities, the east of the Avenue is a mix of 19th century buildings and businesses, providing a more diverse atmosphere.




THE OPERA - 9TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The vibrant 9th Arrondissement lies just north of the illustrious 19th century Paris Opera House. Step into the iconic Haussmann Saint-Lazare district to explore its grand avenues and boulevards. This is a mecca for shopaholics, where the renowned Galeries Lafayette and its majestic dome proudly reign. A few steps away, you can browse the illustrious Printemps department store. Try a snack and sample Ladurée macaroons in its departments. Admire the works of art at the iconic Place Vendôme's most celebrated jewelers. And don't miss Rue des Martyrs with its renowned fromageries, boulangeries, and more. To the south, the 2nd Arrondissement awaits with its harmonious blend of residential and business buildings. Farther north, you'll find the legendary Moulin Rouge in the heart of Pigalle.




CANAL ST-MARTIN 10TH - 11TH ARRONDISSEMENTS

This quartier straddles the canal in the 10th and 11th Arrondissements, from the border of the 3rd Arrondissement over to Père Lachaise Cemetery. Canal Saint-Martin is an up-and-coming neighborhood straddling the canal itself as it winds through the 10th and 11th Arrondissements. Today, this working-class district is where young Parisians congregate, so it has a bohemian element. The cafés and restaurants along Canal Saint-Martin make it a popular destination for Parisians and tourists. Iron footbridge-spanned Canal St-Martin's revival continues thanks to indie-run bars, restaurants, shops, and cultural centers such as Point Éphémère.




PALACE DE LA BASTILLE - 11TH ARRONDISSEMENT

In Paris's most densely populated arrondissement, the 11th (onzième), you can find both The and the New Opera. This primarily residential district is a creative hotbed popular among artists, with a digital museum housed in a foundry, craft breweries, collaborative coffee roasteries, and sizzling new restaurant openings. What's more, its vibrant nightlife along the Rue de la Roquette and Rue Oberkampf has plenty of live music and DJ venues, making it a favourite destination for those who love to go out.




BERCY (12TH ARRONDISSEMENT)

Extending from Place de la Bastille (where the French Revolution first began) to the breathtaking Bois de Vincennes, the 12th Arrondissement is an inviting residential area and a peaceful area of Paris. Explore the old wine warehouse-turned-shopping-center, Bercy Village La Coulée Verte, or take a stroll along the majestic Promenade Plantée, an elevated greenbelt spanning almost three miles. This area of the city is not all business; it is also home to one of Paris's premier concert venues and the Cinémathèque Française.



PLACE D'ITALIE (13TH ARRONDISSEMENT)

Often overlooked, the 13th Arrondissement on Paris' Left Bank is a unique blend of cultures and aesthetics. The modern Place d'Italie is the site of one of the most ambitious urban renewal projects in France, while the Butte aux Cailles area offers cobblestone streets and lively restaurants, cafes, and nightlife, creating a feeling of a village. Along the Seine, the modern business district Paris Rive Gauche and the massive Grande Bibliothèque François Mitterrand (the French National Library) dominate the skyline. To the west, behind Place d'Italie, lies the vibrant Quartier Asiatique – home to Paris' Asian community – where Asian bakeries and Buddhist temples sit amidst towering skyscrapers often decorated with street art.



MONTPARNASSE - 14TH ARRONDISSEMENT

Strolling around Montparnasse is a delight for the eyes. It is a bustling cultural hub, boasting theatres and cinemas on Montparnasse Boulevard, and home to numerous offices within the walls of the towering Tour Montparnasse. But the charm of this neighborhood is in the artistic essence from its heyday as the epicenter of the "Roaring 20s", filled with artist workshops and classic brasseries. Famous names such as Fitzgerald, Hemingway, Chagall, and Modigliani have left their mark in the area. Following the Boulevard Raspail southwards, you will find the esteemed Fondation Cartier, before ending up at the iconic Denfert-Rochereau, with its majestic lion statue and the ever-popular Paris Catacombs – a must-see for every tourist.




VAUGIRARD - 15TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The 15th Arrondissement of Paris, located furthest west on the left bank, is its most populous and contains a fascinating mix of 19th century and modern apartment blocks. Although it lacks the famed landmarks of its immediate neighbours, its culinary attractions make it an idyllic destination for those who enjoy good food without any fuss. You can take a hot air balloon ride from Parc André Citroën and explore the synthetic Île aux Cygnes – the perfect place to indulge your inner gourmet!




TROCADÉRO - 16TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The chic 16th Arrondissement is a neighbourhood of the wealthy. It's filled with lush little parks, broad avenues, stately Haussmannian buildings, and upscale shopping streets. The Trocadéro square, at the summit of the Chaillot hill, is an impressive landmark – offering some of the finest views of the Eiffel Tower from its vibrant cafes. Not to mention, the 16th is home to two renowned Michelin-starred restaurants! Whether it's strolling through the Jardins du Trocadéro or exploring the lesser-known Musée Marmottan Monet, the 16th Arrondissement is certainly one of Paris' most exclusive neighbourhoods.



CLICHY-BATIGNOLLES - 17TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The 17th Arrondissement is a captivating mix of old-world Parisian elegance and contemporary post-industrial beauty. In Clichy-Batignolles, a green, eco-friendly quarter, you'll find a peaceful contrast to the bustle of Place de Clichy. Dubbed a "bobo" spot (or "bourgeois-boheme"), the district is teeming with organic markets, scrumptious restaurants, and narrow alleyways for an idyllic stroll. In the 19th century, the area was frequented by the likes of poets Paul Verlaine and Stéphane Mallarmé, painter Edouard Manet, and author Emile Zola. After exploring its cobblestoned streets and colorful bazaars, you can take a well-deserved break in the trendy Parc Monceau.



MONTMARTRE - 18TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The iconic Montmartre, an 18th Arrondissement neighbourhood, is not only renowned for its winding, ivy-covered streets leading to the majestic Sacré-Cœur basilica, but is also renowned for its off-the-beaten-path neighbour, Batignolles, in the 17th. This historic and creative quartier was home to renowned painters and writers such as Picasso, Renoir, and van Gogh, and is also the home of the Dali Museum. To the south of Montmartre lies the somewhat tame red-light district of Pigalle, host of the Moulin Rouge cabaret, while to its east lies Château Rouge and La Goutte d'Or, which together make up the lively and colourful 'Little Africa' neighbourhood, with its aromatic street markets, vibrant music scene and abundant fabric shops.




BUTTES CHAUMONT - 19TH ARRONDISSEMENT

Boasting two stunning parks, a mile-long canal, and a plethora of bars, restaurants and cultural venues, the northeast corner of Paris is an absolute must-see. From the spectacular Parc de la Villette with its numerous museums and music venues, to the brand-new Philharmonie de Paris, one of the world's most esteemed concert halls, and the Cité des Sciences, visitors are sure to be wowed. Then, of course, there is the idyllic Parc des Buttes Chaumont, with its ravishing grottoes, waterfalls and lake – surely one of the most beautiful parks in Paris!



PÈRE LACHAISE - BELLEVILLE - 20TH ARRONDISSEMENT

The 20th Arrondissement on the eastern edge of Paris holds a special appeal for the art and culture aficionados. Not only is it the final resting place of the rich and famous like Jim Morrison, Oscar Wilde, Édith Piaf, and Chopin, but the bustling Belleville neighborhood is a vibrant, laid-back area with plenty of creative appeal. Check out Le Vieux Belleville for an old-school experience, or explore the unique boutiques and outdoor markets as you take in the street art-covered boulevards.




FRENCHIE * MICHELIN | FRENCH

Frenchie has been a long-time favorite address for Parisians looking for excellent food in stylish surroundings. After chef Greg Marchand was awarded his first Michelin star at the restaurant in January 2019, the accolade has given diners another reason to visit. The unique menu changes every two weeks and is not listed anywhere on the website, making it a surprise every time you go. Classics such as grilled fish and pork belly, as well as more unusual combinations such as foie gras with carrot, tamarind, and macadamia nut, are well-guarded giving you an idea of what to expect from Marchand's modern French menu.



PUR'- JEAN-FRANÇOIS ROUQUETTE * MICHELIN | CREATIVE

Contemporary restaurants at the Park Hyatt, Pur', offer a truly memorable dinner experience. The modern interior designed by Ed Tuttle and located on the iconic rue de la Paix, is both inviting and private with only 35 covers. The colors, lighting and space have been carefully considered, creating a stunning rotunda with a dome and colonnade. Here, the talented Jean–François Rouquette (Taillevent, Le Crillon, La Cantine des Gourmets, Les Muses) shines with his creative and delicious cuisine, beautifully combining the finest produce.



ÉPICURE *** MICHELIN | CREATIVE

Epicure is a culinary institution for French cuisine. The restaurant is situated in the prestigious Le Bristol Paris and is set among a French garden. Indulge in a truly epicurean experience curated by Chef Éric Frechon, who has four Michelin stars to his name, including one star for French brasserie 114 Faubourg. The chef's finesse in French classics is showcased in his signature dishes like artichoke, duck foie gras, and macaroni stuffed with black truffle. Each exquisite course is paired with a glass of wine selected by their in-house sommelier. This fine dining affair delivers an unprecedented experience.



LE GABRIEL **MICHELIN | CREATIVE

This restaurant is ensconced in the elegant, luxurious setting of La Réserve, a townhouse dating back to the 19th century amid a relaxed, on-trend atmosphere. Through different menus, chef Jérôme Banctel invites you to take a journey through his culinary exploration in each morsel you take without leaving Paris. "Escales," "Virée," "Vegetable Virée" and "Périple" reflect the mood of the moment and Le Gabriel's deep-rooted identity. The menus are frequently renewed according to availability and the moment's inspiration.



L' ARPÈGE *** MICHELIN | MODERN

For a transformative dining experience, L'Arpège is the place to go for imaginative dishes inspired by nature. Long before the rise of vegetarian and vegan cuisine, Alain Passard pioneered vegetable-focused fine dining and has been leading the charge at the three-Michelin-star Arpège since the early 2000s. His revolutionary approach to gastronomy revolutionized the restaurant industry with an emphasis on plant-based delicacies. Passard's menus are guided by the four seasons and the five senses, and he relies on open-flame cooking for both his meat and vegetable dishes, bringing out a variety of exciting flavors, textures, and colors. The restaurant also holds the prestigious Michelin Green Star for its commitment to sustainable practices.



ALLIANCE * MICHELIN | MODEN

The Alliance restaurant is a tale of two passionate partners, Toshitaka Omiya, a Japanese chef from Osaka, and Shawn Joyeux, an expert in hospitality, coming together to embark on a culinary journey. Chef Omiya prefers the real flavors of the seasonal ingredients over extravagant ingredients, with his signature dish being foie gras with pot-au-feu vegetables in ginger. His cooking is simple yet eye-catching and the taste is always impeccable. To complete the dishes, the pastry chef, Morgane Rimbaud, adds a delightful, and almost wicked twist. The restaurant opened its doors in November 2015 in a tucked away street in the 5th Arrondissement, near Boulevard Saint-Germain. The place has an atmosphere of both warmth and elegance that reflects the simplicity and refinement of the dishes served.



L'AMBROISIE *** MICHELIN | FRENCH CREATIVE

If you're in search of a quintessentially French dining experience in the heart of Paris, look no further than l'Ambroisie. This exquisite restaurant can be found in an elegant townhouse on the Place des Vosges, its interior filled with antique mirrors, a captivating tapestry and a black and white marble flooring that exudes its regal Florentine ambience. On the culinary side, master chef Bernard Pacaud never fails to mesmerize with his creative dishes that brim with his passion. He makes it all appear effortless, yet each element is placed with remarkable artistry, like a masterpiece painting.





In this land of unwavering kitchen etiquette, the food landscape in the French capital is an assemblage of quality dining experiences at all levels. Bustling with brilliant restaurants with 134 Michelin stars divided among the most haute cuisine eateries, Paris counts a bevy of establishments that show off its cosmopolitan nonchalance and spirit. The Paris Society Group and Moma Group, key players in the catering and hospitality sector in France, are responsible for bringing together many great chefs, architects and prestigious artistic directors to create unique and varied dining concepts.


There has also been a renaissance of Paris's long-established gastronomic landscape, with traditional bistros, brasseries, and stylish restaurants serving classic French cooking made famous by chef Auguste Escoffier. The seemingly unyielding landscape of French haute cuisine has had a jolt from the arrival of chef Jean Imbert, who is taking over the reins in the kitchens of the Hotel Plaza Athénée, formerly run by Gallic culinary virtuoso Alain Ducasse. Similarly, the two-star chef Jean-François Piège, who is behind several restaurants in the city, needs no introduction. With his latest project, Mimosa, he stays on top of the wave of success with his other ventures.

RURAL BY MARC VEYRAT | FRENCH TRADITIONAL

Chef Marc Veyrat opens his new authentic and convivial restaurant with a capacity of 220 seats. In terms of the décor designed by Lionel Jadot, wood takes precedence: the tables, the facade and the walls with patchwork benches and sheepskins placed here and there will quickly make you forget you are in the Palais des Congrès. For the Rural's menu, Marc Veyrat brought the essence of the two-starred restaurant La Maison des Bois' cuisine to recreate a more straightforward menu. Expect lake pike Quenelles, signature verbena juice, free-range chicken and its savoyard matafan and blanquette of veal with almond milk. For dessert, stroll to the presentation table with the buffet of Mémé Caravi: the seasonal shortbread tart, the apple or pear tart, the semolina sabayon with salted butter, praline tart, ice cream, or Savoie cake with wild blueberries.



NOTO | ITALIAN

Named after the Sicilian city Noto, this art deco trattoria sits on the second floor of the Salle Pleyel renowned concert hall. Decorated by designer Laura Gonzalez, the dining room illuminates a joyous mixture of inspirations from traveling all over Sicily, offering a very marked result of converting the syncretic culture of Sicily into the interior design. Chef Patrick Charvet crafts a Sicilian-inspired feast with colorful presentations and bright dressings. For a pleasant meal, try the octopus carpaccio with roasted bell peppers, grapefruit and green mint, and the grilled tuna complemented by caramelized eggplants and squid chips. Finish with a tasty semifreddo with frozen lemon and verbena. Expect an exciting wine list with many Italian labels.





Above all, Victoria Paris is the story of one of the most beautiful private mansions in the city, standing proudly on the Place de l'Etoile. Elegance takes on a majestic dimension in the volumes, the veined marble and the woodwork that dress the venue. However, it shakes up the canons and constrictions, offering a sunny menu and deliberately chic and informal service that reign in this Parisian meeting place.



MAISON RUSSE | RUSSIAN

In the heart of the 16th Arrondissement, a few steps from Place Victor Hugo, 59 Avenue Raymond Poincaré houses this new Russian concept. Hidden inside a historic house is a series of lavishly designed spaces – decked out with a timeless style overseen by designer Laleh Amirassefi. The décor is warm and welcoming, with a mix of Russian-themed ornaments (including a life-size Russian doll), Ottoman-style seating, Persian rugs, plenty of sumptuous fabrics, and glamorous baroque touches. There's also a charming hidden patio populated by trees and flowers and wrought iron furniture adorned with rustic materials. Then there's the "Franco-Russian" menu offering an exquisite blend of Russian and French dishes like baked potato topped with caviar, linguine with lemon bottarga and much more.



BRASSERIE CEZANNE | FRENCH, MEDITERRANEAN

Chez Cézanne, a restaurant with Provençal flavors, offers tasty cuisine in a dashing universe. Inspired by the Provence of Paul Cézanne, you can discover family cuisine in the colors of the South in a friendly spirit. Share a convivial moment in one of the most beautiful districts of Paris, between the Trocadero and Place de l'Etoile, and at the establishment that welcomes you in an exotic atmosphere. A unique and atypical place imagined like a Provençal house, the Brasserie Cézanne immerses you in the good mood of the south.



GIRAFE | FRENCH, SEAFOOD

Girafe provides an upscale dining experience with a fantastic view overlooking the Eiffel tower. Nestled in the heart of the Cité de l'Architecture in Paris, Girafe is all about the gestures of yesteryear. In this stylish seafood restaurant, the fare fluctuates between heritage and modern cuisine as a mixture of simplicity and luxury. Fish, shellfish, and crustaceans are prepared in all their forms – classic, raw, like ceviche or sashimi, and grilled (lobster, sole, turbot). The dining experience combines allure, unexpectedness, and a typical Parisian carefree spirit.




RESTAURANT MONSIEUR BLEU | FRENCH


FOREST RESTAURANT | MEDITERRANEAN AND MIDDLE EASTERN

Forest is the new post–modern refuge installed at the Museum of Modern Art in Paris. Multidisciplinary collective Uchronia has designed the interior that takes on the air of a brutalist lair combining concrete textures, creeping vegetation and serene décor, developing a narrative that evokes a forest–like conception. The Forest is structured around four spaces reflecting Parisian artistic life — the terrace, the entrance, the agora and the large hall. Different but complementary, the rooms and their atmospheres change during the day as the museum's doors open and close, making Forest both the restaurant of the Musée d'Art Moderne de Paris and, in the evening, taking on a life of its own. The food at Forest is quite sophisticated and healthy, with lots of quality vegetables and Middle Eastern ingredients prepared by French virtuoso chef Julien Sebbag, who perfected his mastery in Tel Aviv and is riding the wave of popularity of Israeli restaurants like Miznon.



BAMBINI PARIS | ITALIAN

Bambini is a hip eatery at the Palais de Tokyo with an elaborate Italian theme. As soon as you walk through the door, you are plunged into a contrasting, playful and sophisticated décor, evocative of a festive, colorful and even theatrical Italy. Outside, sheltered under fabric parasols and comfortably installed on flowery benches, the forecourt of Palais de Tokyo vibrates. Besides Italian aperitivo, generous refreshing cocktails like Cleopatra Moscato or Carpano Antica Formula, cicchetti, and tapas, Bambini Paris serves the most tantalizing desserts. These include tiny Neapolitan donuts, all hot for dipping in melted chocolate and Piedmontese hazelnuts, giant lemon tart, or huge cups of homemade ice cream. It is perfect for a sunny afternoon or late-night drinks with friends.



MISS KO | JAPANESE

Miss Ko is a high-concept lounge and restaurant with a transporting quality, inviting a hip, fashionable, very bobo crowd. Inspired by the persona of the mysterious though fictitious Miss Ko, the venue is a Eurasian fusion fantasy world filled with neon and blinking countertops, part Blade Runner, part Alice in Wonderland. A large bar area runs the length of the room and creative drinks showcase ingredients like shochu, lemongrass syrup, and yuzu liqueur. Try the Crazy Mo Fo, an exotic blend of coconut milk, Bahn lot, bourha and cane sugar. The food menu, by chef Fabrice Monot, is full of inventive Japanese-French fare, dishes like rainbow samurai rolls, made from California salmon, avocado and mango, Asian-style ribs, and a black salmon burger. Desserts are similarly inventive and a range of funky bubble teas, including delicious and refreshing lychee and kiwi, are also on offer.





A veritable institution, La Maison du Caviar was founded in 1956 by the exclusive importer of Caspian Sea caviars at the instigation of His Majesty the Shah of Iran. A stone's throw from the Champs-Élysées, in the heart of the Golden Triangle, this intimate address in the 8th Arrondissement has rare know-how and promises its guests fabulous culinary discoveries around the best caviars and exceptional iodized products. La Maison du Caviar has been attracting loyal Parisians and an epicurean international clientele with its prestige for decades.



DIEP RESTAURANT | CHINESE & THAI

Established in 1985 by the Diep family, the restaurant bearing the same name is nestled just off the most beautiful avenue in the world and has succeeded in carving out a stellar reputation for itself in the Parisian restaurant scene over the years. Diep specializes in an amalgam of Chinese and Thai cuisine, executed with finesse and delicacy. A wealth of eastern flavors awaits your palate, and you can choose between the subtleties of Chinese cooking on one hand and spicier aromatics of Thai cuisine on the other. A stone's throw from the Champs Élysées, Diep is a small place set on Pierre Charond Street. Inside, a dimmed ambiance is elevated by calm Chinese music and fine Chinese art.




MUN RESTAURANT PARIS | ASIAN FUSION

Mun restaurant, pronounced /mɪn/, set at 52 Avenue Champs-Élysées, is an ode to Asia displayed in the interior design by Eve Von Romberg and Charlotte Besson-Oberlin. 
VERDE | FRENCH

The door marks the entry point to this world where everything centers around a grand Royal Table crafted from antique Breccia marble. MANKO RESTAURANT | PERUVIAN

Peruvian cuisine has been an inspiration for every culture in the world for centuries. Influences from Europe, Japan, China and Africa have blended with the ancient Andean culture and the vitality of the Amazon, giving birth to a unique world of flavors revealed and shared in the present. This is how Peruvian food is celebrated and how Manko arrived in Paris. The architect behind the decor is Laura Gonzales, who created and brought her insights with a hint of authenticity and strong identities, mixing it with Peruvian influences and those that have originated in the Andes. "The idea was to succeed in transcribing the raw refinement," said the architect.




GIGI RESTAURANT | ITALIAN

Gigi is situated above the Théâtre des Champs-Élysées and is designed by Hugo Toro. 
L'AVENUE | FRENCH

One of the best of any Costes Brothers eatery, L'Avenue, is set in the 8th Arrondissement opposite Christian Dior in a meticulous brassiere decorated by Jacques Garcia. It is a place with alluring high-wattage clientele in winter and in summer alike. Most of the fun is sitting outside; however, inside, a dark and attractive space is layered in heavy red velvet, Murano chandeliers and a seductive lounge space that perk with life from day until very late at night. A traditional brasserie menu with trendy flair begins with a morning breakfast menu of egg, pastry and smoked fish specialties. Lunch and dinner are a more elaborate affair with homemade foie gras served with toast, a full raw bar and a delectable selection of salads.



APICIUS * MICHELIN | FRENCH

Apicius, with a Michelin star to its name, is set in a sumptuous 18th century private mansion that calls to mind a small palace. Created by Jean-Pierre Vigato, a champion of fine dining, it is now linked to the talents of Mathieu Pacaud, who alchemizes ingredients and creates a symbiosis of tradition and creativity. Accompanied by Jérôme Chaucesse as a pastry chef, together they reinvent the classics. In the spirit of the new Apicius, the Bar is the enfant terrible of the house. The mixologists show off their brilliance, maneuvering layered cocktails in spontaneous creations.



LE BOEUF SUR LE TOIT I FRENCH

The Boeuf Sur le Toit is a famous brasserie in an art deco style with wood paneling, paintings, sculptures, engraved mirrors, a large mahogany bar and a marble entrance. Since its creation in 1922, the history of Le Bœuf sur le Toit has been closely linked to a group of artists, musicians, poets and painters who met every week with Jean Cocteau – then the owner of the premises. Artists who frequented the venue include Christian Dior, Coco Chanel, Francis Picabia, Picasso, Erik Satie, and later Charles Trenet or Léo Ferré. Faithful to the state of mind of Le Bœuf sur le Toit, the interior designer Alexis Mabille favors a unique decor inspired by the restaurant in its most glorious years, the 1930s and 1940s. Le Boeuf sur le Toit serves excellent, very well-prepared and classic French cuisine, with dishes like sea bream in sesame sauce or duck breast in honey and ginger. The cocktail menu is the result of close collaboration with the iconic Maison Hennessy. Le Bœuf sur le Toit is experienced as an evolving place where you can spend the evening without leaving it - from the restaurant to the bar, to the music hall, smoking room and private lounges.




LE PIAF | FRENCH

Nestled in the heart of the 8th Arrondissement, a stone's throw from the Champs-Élysées is le Piaf – a restaurant, a bar, and nightclub. A welcoming atmosphere, red velvet benches and subdued lighting enhanced by candlelight guarantee mellow evenings. It's the temple of the Parisian nightlife whose décor was designed by Charles Tassin. It also comes alive during the day with its restaurant, designed by Jacques Garcia. Refined and modern, the place lends itself perfectly to breakfast on the terrace, lunch under the veranda or dinner in a golden and subdued light. Adapting to all tastes, the Matignon menu offers "rustic yet classic" cuisine with gourmet and balanced dishes prepared on site.



BRASSERIE PASTIS I SICILIAN

After opening the Cézanne brasserie in 2019, this same group of friends set their sights on Place Saint-Augustin with Pastis, a new Mediterranean brasserie in the colors of the dolce vita. You will be seduced by the warm cuisine, crunchy seasonal vegetables, fish and seafood cooked in the Sicilian way, and fresh produce coming directly from Italy. The young chef Paul Alexandre Laumont, originally from southern Italy, knows how to intrigue the taste buds by creating pretty, colorful and harmonious plates.



RAN | JAPANESE

Ran – named after the last film by the great Akira Kurosawa – presents the world of today's enigmatic Tokyo enhanced by notes of French gastronomy. RAN is not simply a restaurant, it is a feeling and a space suspended between two times: a contemporary Japan and an atmosphere of a mythical former private mansion of the Marquis de Lafayette, dating back to 1728. Moma Group and Blackcode took over the house, entrusting the décor to the interior design alchemist Tristan Auer who combined tradition and modernity, refinement and elegance, creating sensual and singular beauty. In the kitchen, chef Shuhei Yamashita, from Kinugawa Vendôme, signs the menu of Japanese gastronomy with modern twists. Dried bonito broth – dashi style – with mushrooms, salmon carpaccio, chicken gyozas, and vegetables are some of the specialties.




CREATURES | VEGETARIAN

The open-space bar facing all of Paris welcomes Parisiens and globetrotters from morning to night. It becomes one of the most craved spots in the capital on sunny days. It is set in a unique space allowing guests to start, continue or accompany the culinary experience. This is the most beautiful rooftop in the capital at the top of the Galeries Lafayette Paris Haussmann. Creatures stands out as the essential spot during the summer in Paris. For lunch and dinner, discover the vegetarian cuisine of chef Julien Sebbag.



PERRUCHE | MEDITERRANEAN

The cocktail bar and restaurant Perruche is a lush rooftop oasis with a Mediterranean vibe and an incredible 360-degree view of Paris. Perched atop an ultra-lux Printemps Haussmann department store, Perruche (or Parakeet in English) sprawls across a 5,380-square-foot rooftop terrace filled with lounge sofas and dining tables. Open daily from lunch to late night, the rooftop offers seating both at the lovely terrace and also in the very stylish indoor restaurant, complete with panoramic floor-to-ceiling windows. Enjoy sunny cocktails or choose from a food menu offering seasonal and colorful dishes perfect for sharing. Given the location, Perruche is an ideal pit stop after a day of shopping. Still, this sophisticated, chic, Mediterranean-ish oasis is worth visiting any time of the day, or at night, when the rhythm of live music fills the terrace.



COCO | FRENCH

Coco is housed in the historic Charles Garnier building of the Paris Opera House, the Palais Garnier. The two syllables say a lot – CoCo sounds like a champagne bubble, a mixture of chic and laughter. When the Paris Opera House, the Palais Garnier, first opened in 1875, the idea was to always have a glorious place to dine before and after performances. By opening its doors, Coco fulfills that vision. Laurent de Gourcuff, the founder of the group Paris Society, is the wizard behind the venue, together with a young designer Corinne Sachot. De Gourcuff invited young French chef Julien Chicoisne to run the kitchen with a fresh, contemporary interpretation of surf and turf. Make way for beautiful dishes and intense flavors, including an entire cooked artichoke stuffed with green beans and mustard dressing. Opt for churros with a vanilla cream and chocolate sauce for a sweet and succulent ending.



MIMOSA RESTAURANT | MEDITERRANEAN

Located on the edge of the central courtyard, the restaurant is open from lunchtime until late in the evening. Its menu is designed by the famous Michelin-starred chef Jean-François Piège, responsible for honoring French gastronomic craftsmanship. Mimosa combines nature, pleasure and the sun. For chef Piège, "Mimosa is an ode to France, to its exceptional products, heritage, and identity." That's why there's nothing artificial, complicated, or overwhelming: just a beautiful bar, spectacular staging, and a generous menu.




CAFÉ LAPÉROUSE I FRENCH

Café Lapérouse is anchored in the freshly renovated Hotel de la Marine set at the place de la Concorde. A spectacular romantic décor was created by Cordélia de Castellane, who carefully considered every detail of the décor. All elements were made by French craftsmen, from the bar to the seats, including the woodwork and ceramics. Colorful prints in "Lapérouse blue," touches of art deco, and West Indies influences pay tribute to the 18th century French explorer who serves as the restaurant's namesake. All floral and aquatic motifs on the plates and the impressive mural were drawn by the interior designer herself. To satisfy socialite appetites, the menu takes on the repertoire of new classics of the Parisian brasserie: tuna ceviche in coconut milk, royal sea bream carpaccio and great Parisian classics: foie gras terrine and a croque-lapérouse with truffle and to top it all off the meringue filled with pistachio cream.



HÔTEL COSTES | MEDITERRANEAN

The restaurant at the Hôtel Costes is a new-generation gastronomic venue. The atmosphere is electric, the déco set of velvets, brocades, and lots and lots of tassels making it sumptuous. As for the menu, it is full of decadent hits, and the air smells like roses and musk. The entire ground floor is lit almost exclusively with candles. At Hotel Costes, meals are served all hours of the day and night. Jean-Louis Costes has created a menu including his favorite dishes with an eclectic range of "signature" dishes made using seasonal ingredients: delectable asparagus for a light lunch, "foie gras" that may be shared by two guests as a delightful snack.



KINUGAWA VENDOME | JAPANESE

Kinugawa Vendome is a legendary venue for those who seek Japanese fine cuisine. As such, it has been hosting a prestigious and cosmopolitan clientele for more than 30 years. The restaurant can be described as an Izakaya with a contemporary twist, housing majestic graphic designs within its elegant architecture. Its atmosphere is one of luxury and warmth. Daichi Ando's work as Kinugawa Vendome's chef, recreates the essence of Japanese culinary tradition, through his virtuosity and unique vision.



BALAGAN RESTAURANT | ISRAELI

Balagan (which means hullabaloo in Hebrew) sets the tone for any type of celebration. Helmed by a doyen of Israeli cuisine, chefs Assaf Granit's and Uri Navon's dishes at Balagan are an anthology of cleverly juxtaposed Mediterranean flavors: generous and aromatic cuisine, with a masterful use of spices, chillies and herbs. The interesting wine list showcases wines from the Mediterranean (Israel, Lebanon, Italy, and Spain). As for the dining area, seating is mainly divided across cozy corners and larger, but intimate booths. A few stools are propped by the open kitchen, which forms the center of the electrifying energy permeating through the restaurant.




LOULOU | ITALIAN

Loulou, the restaurant at the Musée des Arts Décoratifs, boasts a unique and privileged location at the heart of the Palais du Louvre. 
LANGOSTERIA | ITALIAN, MEDITERRANEAN

At the Brasserie Thoumieux, the atmosphere is chic and uninhibited. Typical brasserie dishes are revisited with brio for a traditional, hearty and tasty French cuisine are on the menu. Let yourself be seduced by quality products worked with passion. Frisée aux Lardons, Escargots de Bourgogne, Tartare or Rigatoni aux morilles, the exhaustive menu will satisfy all desires. LAPÉROUSE | MEDITERRANEAN

Laperouse is a quayside landmark established in 1766, renowned for upscale gastronomy in richly decorated lounges. Zola, Maupassant, Baudelaire, Proust. These famous lounges/salons saw Victor Hugo-Colette, who wrote "Chatte" there, Serge Gainsbourg, who met Jane there. Marcel Proust referenced it in his 1913 novel *In Search of Lost Time*. 
LE PETIT LUTETIA | FRENCH





L'ECLAIREUR | FASHION

First launched in the early 1980s as a men's-only concept store L'Eclaireur now has several locations around the city which also carry women's clothing, in addition to luxury home design items, bags and accessories, and objets d'art. The brainchild of fashionista couple Martine and Armand Hadida, L'Eclaireur is as much known for its prestigious setting as it is for its high. One of the boutiques is housed in the former stables of a private manor in a hidden spot near the square, the Place des Victoires right in the heart of BCBG (bon chic bon genre) Paris. L'Eclaireur carries a wide range of prêt à porter (ready-to-wear) and haute couture (high-end) designer lines, including Alexander McQueen, Emilio Pucci, Oscar de la Renta, Maison Margiela, and other well-known names. It's also a hotspot for up-and-coming international designers.




PRINTEMPS | FASHION, BEAUTY & HOME DECOR

More focused on luxury brands than the Galeries Lafayette, the French department store Printemps carries high-end beauty products, jewelry, clothing, furniture, and more. The chain has several locations around Paris, but the store on Boulevard Haussmann stands out. The store's façade has been declared a historical monument and the panoramic rooftop view of the Paris skyline is quite simply glorious. As for the shopping, the customer service is exceptional, and with several floors of high-fashion styles, you could spend days getting lost in gorgeous garments.



THE GALERIES LAFAYETTE (LES GALERIES LAFAYETTE)

Surely on every shopper's list when visiting Paris, the flagship store of Les Galeries Lafayette is a must-see. The impressive exterior of this classic Parisian department store enchants as much as eight levels of designer clothing, cosmetics, and housewares tempt you at every turn under a jaw-dropping stained-glass dome. Besides, the Galeries Lafayette is also home to more than 15 different dining options, with menus ranging from homemade hamburgers to caviar. With everything you'll ever need right inside the department store, it's a great place to go on rainy days.



MEMO | FRAGRANCES

On elegant Rue Cambon in the 1st Arrondissement sits Memo Paris, an upscale boutique whose perfume label was created by Paris-born Clara Molloy and her husband, John. It takes the roots from the many journeys this couple shared through their passion for travel. Les Echappées, or "the escapes" is a collection of fragrances, each symbolizing one of these journeys. From Lalibela in Ethiopia to Granada, Spain to Inlé Lake in Burma, every unique scent transports you to a distant land. Memo Paris has recently created The Flying Collection, four luxurious fragrances exclusively available at their Paris boutique and at London's Harvey Nichols. Stop by to discover this fragrance collection inspired by faraway lands.



AVENUE MONTAIGNE | FASHION & BEAUTY

Avenue Montaigne boasts numerous haute couture stores like Louis Vuitton, Dior, Chanel, Fendi, Valentino, Ralph Lauren, Yves Saint Laurent, Gucci, Chanel, Prada, Chloe, Giorgio Armani, Versace, and Dolce & Gabbana, as well as jewelers like Bulgari and other upscale establishments. By the 1980s, the avenue was considered "la grande dame" of French streets for high fashion and accessories and is now considered more important than rue du Faubourg Saint Honoré. Several established clothing designers are located here, particularly the LVMH (Moët Hennessy Louis Vuitton) group. LVMH bought investment and international attention to the street, and its stable top designers and firms, such as Céline, Louis Vuitton, Inès de la Fressange, and formerly Christian Lacroix, own a substantial portfolio of the street's real estate.




LEGACY | CONCEPT STORE

Created in 2019 by Sébastien Chapelle and BOW Group, Legacy is an avant–garde store specifically designed for luxury hotels. Before conquering the world's greatest capitals, the first of its kind opened at the Fouquet's Barrière Paris Hotel near the Champs–Elysées. This unique place invites visitors to discover personalized services and exclusive products, including the most sought–after creations in the worlds of high tech, lifestyle, watches, grooming, accessories, and jewelry, as well as a selection of beautiful books and a space dedicated to travel in all its forms.





From Louboutin to Chanel and Louis Vuitton to Longchamp, famous luxury brand names dominate around the Place Vendôme or along the Rue Saint Honoré. This oh-so-chic part of Paris lies north of the Tuileries Gardens and extends west to the Palais de l'Elysées, the home of the French President. The area attracts many tourists, window shoppers, and luxury lovers alike.



LEGRAND FILLES ET FILS | GOURMET

Legrand Filles et Fils originally opened in 1880 as a gourmet grocery store, and through the next five generations and 140 years, became an iconic destination for gourmet food and fine wine. Wine has always been at the heart of Legrand Filles et Fils. Stepping into the shop from the épicerie will make you feel like you were in Paris in the early 1900s. From the wood shelves and tiled floors to the corks inlaid on the ceiling, every detail is authentic. You'll find plenty of wines, liqueurs, and other products, including roasted coffee, loose–leaf teas, incredible jams, gourmet olive oil and vinegar, and plenty of sumptuous sweet treats neatly arranged in glass jars.





Chocolatier and pâtissier Jacques Genin is a man of many sweet skills. In addition to his diverse array of chocolates in seasonal flavors, including praline and ganache, it's easy to become seduced by his other specialties, such as caramels with mango-passion fruit and pâtes de fruits in a rainbow of flavors. The master chocolate maker also has quite a reputation for patisseries. His Paris-Brest, a choux pastry filled with hazelnut praline cream, is widely known to be the best in the city.



GUERLAIN | BEAUTY & FRAGRANCES

The name Guerlain has been around since 1828, standing for bespoke fragrances. Although founded in 1828, the Guerlain name rose to fame in 1852 when its founder, Pierre-François-Pascal Guerlain, created a special scent for Empress Eugenie's wedding to French Emperor Napoleon III. The first bottle was decorated with bees, a symbol of the empire, and today's bottles continue to follow that tradition. While their popular perfumes can be bought around the world, here in Paris, in this little shop in Passy, you can still get a perfume designed just for you. One, that according to the in-house perfumiers, will suit your personality, your character, and express your individuality.



ASSOULINE PARIS | BOOK STORE

There's no other brand that marries printed books and luxury quite like Assouline. Prosper Assouline and his wife, Martine, opened their first Paris boutique in 2005, intending for it to be a destination for book lovers and luxury gift shoppers alike. The bookstore is perfectly situated at 35 Rue Bonaparte in Saint-Germain-des-Prés, just a few steps away from the illustrious Café de Flore and Les Deux Magots, both cultural and literary legends in their own rights. The signature red walls are warm and inviting and various *objets d'art* punctuate the space exude an art gallery feel. While the floor-to-ceiling, Mondrian-style shelves are heavy with books covering a variety of topics ranging from art, architecture, travel, gastronomy, luxury cars, and fashion.




LE BON MARCHÉ | DEPARTMENT STORE

Le Bon Marché Rive Gauche was the first department store in the world. It opened in 1852 in Paris at the instigation of Aristide Boucicaut and his wife, Marguerite. They were both in favor of "a new kind of store that would thrill all the senses." Combining unconventionality and elegance, this unique space designed by the architect Louis-Charles Boileau and the engineer Gustave Eiffel displayed a singular style influenced by the creative vitality of Rive Gauche. An elegant atmosphere and a refined selection of high-end products and services make Le Bon Marché Rive Gauche the most selective department store in Paris.



SHAKESPEARE AND COMPANY | BOOK STORE

Shakespeare and Company has long been a temple of knowledge and creativity situated on the banks of the Seine opposite Notre Dame, giving off an almost whimsical, lost-in-time aura. The bookstore was opened and operated by American expat Sylvia Beach. It was frequented by the likes of Ernest Hemingway, James Joyce, Gertrude Stein, Ezra Pound, the Fitzgeralds, and many other great writers who called Paris home at the time. Its original incarnation published Joyce's Ulysses, therefor the place needs no introduction. There isn't a book lover in the world who hasn't heard of – and dreamt of shopping at – Shakespeare and Company in Paris.





MUSEUM OF GUSTAVE MOREAU

The mystical world of Gustave Moreau has remained enclosed behind the heavy curtains of his residence since his death in 1898. Never marrying and living with his parents until they passed away, the father figure of the Symbolist movement was terrified by the idea that the 14,000 works he had produced, sumptuously framed and thoroughly arranged on his walls would be scattered away. To protect and preserve his oeuvre, he decided to bequeath his house and everything in it to the State on the condition that everything remained as he left it. The place is a fantastic journey into the mind of an eminent representative of the tormented and extravagant fin de siècle aesthetic, one whose legacy still survives today!




YVES SAINT LAURENT MUSEUM

Yves Saint Laurent was one of Paris's greatest fashion icons. Catch a glimpse of his visionary world by entering the space where he outfitted elegant Parisians. Discreetly located along Avenue Marceau in the 16th Arrondissement, the 19th century mansion where Saint Laurent and his partner Pierre Bergé worked from 1974 to 2002 opened as the Yves Saint Laurent Museum in October 2017. Photos of Yves Saint Laurent's pieces worn by models and celebrities hang on the walls, complimenting his design sketches. He drew inspiration from artists such as Mondrian and Picasso and was inspired by his journeys to Morocco and cultures of sub–Saharan Africa, Russia, Spain, and Asia. Many haute couture ensembles on display could easily be worn today, bringing to mind one of his famous quotes: "Fashion fades, style is eternal."



THE MUSÉE MARMOTTAN MONET

The Musée Marmottan Monet, set in what was once a hunting lodge on the edge of the Bois de Boulogne, now houses an incredible selection of Impressionist paintings. In addition to Monet's work, the beautiful rooms house other Impressionist paintings by the artist's friends and contemporaries. These include paintings by Pissarro, Renoir, Sisley, Degas, and many others, as well as the world's largest collection of works by Berthe Morisot, a master Impressionist in her own right and sister-in-law to Edouard Manet. Passy and its pearls often go utterly unnoticed. If you have, time surely visit the museum.






This museum is an attribute to the diversity of human culture. It's a highly inspiring overview of indigenous and folk art that spans four main sections – Oceania, Asia, Africa, and the Americas. Displayed in a refreshingly unorthodox interior without rooms or high walls, an impressive array of masks, carvings, weapons, jewelry, and more make up the body of the rich collection.




AUGUSTE RODIN MUSEUM

Sculptor, painter, sketcher, engraver, and collector Auguste Rodin donated his entire collection to the French state in 1908 on the proviso that it dedicate his former workshop and showroom, the beautiful 1730 Hôtel Biron, to displaying his works. This is where he lived and worked while in Paris. Rodin's artwork is not only installed in the mansion itself but also in its rose-filled garden – one of the most peaceful places in central Paris. The rose garden is a wonderful spot to contemplate his famous work, The Thinker. Other sculptural highlights are The Gates of Hell, the 180 figures of which comprise an intricate scene from Dante's Inferno: Rodin's marble monument to love. The Kiss: and the world's largest collection of works by Rodin's protégé and muse, Camille Claudel. On the first floor, in room 12, admire paintings by Van Gogh and Monet that belonged to Rodin. The ground floor 'Rodin at the Hôtel Biron' room, incorporates an eclectic collection of sculptures and curiosities acquired by Rodin and placed in the room where he worked in 1908.




THE ORSAY MUSEUM (MUSÉE D'ORSAY)

The Orsay Museum truly is an Impressionist gem. Built as a train station in the 19th century's Belle Époque, Musée d'Orsay was transformed into a museum to house France's collection of 19th century paintings when the Louvre literally ran out of space. Here you can see the best works of Manet, Monet, Cézanne, Degas, Renoir, Sisley, and a stunning collection of van Goghs. There are about 2,000 paintings and 600 sculptures and other artworks on show, but it's not just quantity that counts. The museum is special because it houses the largest collection of Impressionist and post-Impressionist masterpieces worldwide.



THE LOUVRE MUSEUM

From Leonardo da Vinci to the Venus de Milo to Greek and Egyptian sculpture, the Louvre Museum in Paris has the most extensive art collection in the world. The Louvre covers more than 4,000 years of art history going back to ancient civilizations and the birth of art as we know it. You'll see the French masters and masterpieces of the Italian Renaissance. You'll even get to view the royal crowns of French emperors and kings. Definitely book Louvre-guided private tours with priority access and go directly to the most famous works of art. Once the three-hour tour concludes, you can continue exploring the Louvre Museum independently and at your own pace.




THE MUSÉE NATIONAL PICASSO

One of Paris's most treasured art collections is showcased inside the mid-17th century Hôtel Salé, an exquisite private mansion owned by the city since 1964. The Musée National Picasso is a staggering art museum devoted to Spanish artist Pablo Picasso (1881–1973), who spent much of his life living and working in Paris. The collection includes more than 5,000 drawings, engravings, paintings, ceramic works, and sculptures by the grand maître (great master), although they're not all displayed simultaneously.





The centuries-old Natural History Museum and surrounding Jardin des Plantes have so much to offer that you can easily spend an entire day there. The museum's two main galleries are both impressive architectural gems offering all things natural sciences: from a great parade of animals – both stuffed and skeletons – to examples of insects, rocks, minerals, plants, and everything in between.






THE ARTS



DALÍ PARIS

Tucked away in the heart of Paris lies the largest private collection of Salvador Dalí's art: The Dalí Museum and Gallery, just off the famed Place du Tertre in Montmartre. Boasting 29 museum—sized sculptures, 15 monumental—sized sculptures, and 10 jeweled sculptures, the Dalí Universe Sculpture Collection is a testament to the genius of the Catalan artist, his iconographic images realized in three–dimensional form through the traditional lost wax method of bronze casting. In addition to the sculptures, visitors can also explore a fascinating array of photographs, glass works, prints, etchings, drawings, and paintings—all of them as intriguing as they are unmistakably Dalí.






Situated right next to the Parc Monceau, the Musée Nissim de Camondo is a rarity among museums. Taking a step inside this impeccably maintained early 20th century mansion is like entering an aristocrat's private residence, not a museum. Count Moïse de Camondo, an Ottoman-born banker and art collector, had this beautiful house built in 1911 as a home for his extensive collection of 18th century French artwork and furniture. The interiors remain untouched, providing an exquisite glimpse into the past.




THE LOUIS VUITTON FOUNDATION

The architectural masterpiece, the Louis Vuitton Foundation, housed in the magnificent Frank Gehry building that stands proud at the edge of the Bois de Boulogne, invites you to a day of discovering the beauty of art and architecture. Take your time to appreciate the exterior of the building before stepping in. You'll soon realize that the visit is worthwhile only for the architecture. Pick up a map to guide you around, as this building is anything but straightforward – it's full of curves and meanders, and its exhibitions will transport you to different floors and levels.




TOKYO PALACE (PALAIS DE TOKYO)

Europe's largest center for contemporary creation, the Palais de Tokyo, is an effervescent, audacious and pioneering place, brimming with life and creativity. After its renovation in 2012, the Palais de Tokyo became Europe's largest contemporary art center, an inviting environment to explore and meet some of the greatest creators of our time. A journey through the history of artistic creation, the Palais de Tokyo is an exciting portal to the present and a window to the future.



LA GALERIE DIOR

At 30 Avenue Montaigne, Christian Dior's hôtel particulier was as "modest in scale as his dream was ambitious" when it opened in 1946 with only three workshops and 85 employees. However, within a few years it had grown, reaching neighbouring buildings. La Galerie Dior is a must-see destination for any fashion fan – this exhibition area takes you to the core of the Christian Dior Maison universe. Uncover the designer's inspirations and history through a series of mesmerizing displays in this remarkable museum.





Set afloat on the illustrious Seine, opposite the grandeur of the Grand Palais, the world's first floating urban art gallery beckons. Named in homage to Paris' timeless motto "Fluctuat nec mergitur," meaning "tossed by the waves but does not sink," the ephemeral art gallery pays tribute to international art icon Banksy and Paris' very own Invader, with a captivating, if small, permanent collection. If you wish, embark on an adventure of street art on the river.




THE ORANGERIE (MUSÉE DE L'ORANGERIE)

The Musée de l'Orangerie houses the famous Water Lilies by Monet. He donated them to the French people as a symbol of peace the day after the Armistice on November 11, 1918. In the same year, his close friend, Prime Minister Georges Clemenceau, invited him to exhibit his water lilies at the Orangerie. The eight monumental and curved panels were installed at the Orangerie in accordance with Monet's instructions in 1927, a few months after his death. It is simply one of the greatest artistic achievements of early 20th–century painting. These panels surround and envelop the viewer in an aquatic landscape dotted with water lilies, willow branches, trees, and reflections of clouds. Monet stated, "It gives the illusion of an infinite whole, of a wave with no horizon or shore."





Behind the doors of 59 Rivoli, an extraordinary Parisian art space awaits. Providing a workshop, gallery, and squat for thirty artists, this creative hub is overflowing with talent. The walls are adorned with politically-charged collages, plants grow through cement blocks, and bright paintings dance on easels. A world away from the other buildings on the renowned Rue de Rivoli, 59 Rivoli is often decorated with posters, banners, and multimedia artworks hanging from the balconies. Enter this bewitching building and discover a world of art.




CENTRE POMPIDOU

Centre Pompidou – Europe's largest museum of modern art – opened its doors in 1977 and now boasts a collection of over 60,000 works from the surrealists, cubists, pop artists and other masters of the 20th and 21st centuries. Here you can explore the works of David Hockney, Picasso, Klee, Philippe Starck, Andy Warhol and many more. Although nestled in the middle of the medieval Marais quarter, the museum stands out like an alien amidst the hustle and bustle of Place Georges Pompidou outside. Here you will find street performers, mimes, jugglers, budding artists and musicians – and the iconic Stravinsky fountain – a whimsical water–spraying sculpture inspired by the great composer. Centre Pompidou is truly the place to be for discovering the greats of modern art and design.





Founded and owned by David Zwirner, an experienced art dealer from Cologne, the David Zwirner Gallery has been providing a platform for the world's greatest artists – from Jeff Koons, Yayoi Kusama, and Kerry James Marshall, to the artworks of Paul Klee, Donald Judd, and Diane Arbus – for over a quarter–century across four global locations – Paris, London, New York City, and Hong Kong – where Parisians can truly experience art from some of the greatest figures of our time.





The Parisian contemporary art scene has long held a fondness for Emmanuel Perrotin, who first opened his own "gallery" in a small apartment back in 1990. Fast forward to the present day, and the renowned tastemaker now operates 18 monumental spaces across the globe. His roster of esteemed artists is truly impressive, spanning pop–artists such as JR, Takashi Murakami and Maurizio Cattelan to conceptual giants like Elmgreen & Dragset and Laurent Grasso.




ATELIER DES LUMIÈRES

The Atelier des Lumières opened in April 2018 as Paris's first digital and immersive art space. A captivating inaugural exhibition showcasing the works of Klimt and Schiele was met with wild success. Its unique approach to introducing artists and their life's work, with digital and video presentations projected onto its walls, staircases, and industrial elements, makes it an extraordinary canvas. Dating back to 1835, this former foundry, used to supply iron for the French navy and railroads, now immerses visitors in light, art, and music. As they stand, sit, or roam around the space, they find themselves surrounded by captivating artwork and illuminated by digital projections.




THE VILLA LA ROCHE & THE MAISON JEANNERET

For architecture fans, in particular those who appreciate the genius of Modernist master Le Corbusier, a visit to Villa La Roche and its neighbour, Maison Jeanneret, is a must! These residential properties were the third Parisian commission of the Swiss architect, alongside Immeuble Molitor in the 16th Arrondissement and Villa Savoye in the suburb of Poissy, and were recently named a transnational UNESCO World Heritage site. Today, Villa La Roche houses a museum celebrating Le Corbusier's legacy, containing over 8,000 drawings, photographs and notes.



GALERIE KAMEL MENNOUR

Kamel Mennour's story is a captivating one. Hailing from Algeria and raised in the suburbs of Paris, Mennour was an economics student with a passion for photography. In 1999, he followed his dreams and opened a small gallery in Saint Germain des Prés. Here he showcased his favorite artists, including the likes of Annie Leibovitz, Larry Clark and Gregg Araki, to name a few – all of whom hadn't been represented in Paris yet. His determined pursuit of these renowned photographers soon became legendary. In less than five years, his gallery had become the go–to spot for all things contemporary photography in Paris.





The Fondation Cartier pour l'Art Contemporain – often referred to simply as the Fondation Cartier – is a beacon of contemporary art. Its doors are always open to explore innovative topics and break down boundaries. It provides an eclectic and multidisciplinary platform that crosses all areas of contemporary creation, resulting in unprecedented collaboration between artists, scientists, philosophers, musicians and architects.



THE FONDATION GIACOMETTI

In June 2018, the Fondation Giacometti opened the Alberto Giacometti museum – more than 50 years after the iconic sculptor's death – to exhibit his extraordinary body of work. It included 350 sculptures, 90 paintings, and an astonishing 5,000 drawings, lithographs, and notebooks. This small and special place was chosen for its atelier–feel in the 14th Arrondissement, where the artist had resided for over four decades. Now, his beloved Walking Man has a fittingly memorable tribute.






For any cinephile, the Frank Gehry-designed Cinémathèque Française is a veritable dream come true, holding an impressive collection of some of the most iconic props and costumes ever seen on screen. Among them, you'll find Elizabeth Taylor's and Vivien Leigh's costumes, as well as the iconic head of Mrs. Bates from 'Psycho'. Not to mention the retrospectives and showings of cult classics hosted by the cinema.



STREET ART

Paris, a place of creativity and life, is home to some of the most dynamic and vibrant street art seen in any city. From the mid-1980s when a boom in the number of street artists and artworks emerged, to now, Paris has grown an astounding street art culture, with inspiring murals scattered all around. The city's 20 arrondissements are adorned with Murs d'expression, and many renowned artists, such as Jef Aérosol, Zevs, Invader, Kashink, Blek Le Rat, Jérôme Mesnager and M.CHAT, have left their mark on this city, making it one of the best places to experience street art.






A croissant and coffee are what most people think of at a tea room or café, but when you visit a café in Paris, they are so much more. And what better way to discover the streets of Paris than by letting your taste buds be your guide? The selection of 'salons de thé' on the list includes specialty pastry shops, tea rooms and cafés. 


ANGELINA | TEA ROOM




BERTHILLON | ICE CREAM SHOP

This ice cream shop and salon on the small island of Île Saint-Louis has become a Paris summer staple. For nearly 70 years now, the Berthillon family has been serving sorbets, ice creams, and pastries out of the quaint wood-panelled storefront at 31 Rue Saint-Louis-en-l'Île. La glace here has been rated the best ice cream in Paris many times over, it is guaranteed that whatever you choose you won't be disappointed. If you're having a tough time choosing, try the wild strawberry sorbet, sorbet à la fraise des bois — it's how Berthillon first gained fame.



FRENCH TEATIME AU RITZ PARIS | TEA ROOM

There are two main kinds of afternoon teas at the Ritz, with or without champagne. There's the English-style served with finger sandwiches and cakes in the Bar Vendome and the French teatime (goûter à la française) that takes place in the Salon Proust. It is an evocative, wood-lined world unto itself. Cocoon yourself in the intimate, serene atmosphere of this observatory on the rich mix of life that pulses throughout the Ritz Paris. Enjoy the magic and skillfulness of pastry chef François Perret under the watchful portrait eye of Marcel Proust. Typical French biscuits and cakes are from Proust's era, where he sat by his favorite fireplace and enjoyed his legendary Madeleines, given center stage here.






The French art of the apéro, or early evening drinks, is one of traditions the French uphold with near-religious obsession and you must experience it when in Paris. Usually occurring between 5–8 p.m., these "afterworks" are an opportunity for friends and co-workers to catch up over a glass of wine and a charcuterie board. THE COMPTOIR GÉNÉRAL I COCKTAIL BAR



DRAGON | BAR



The atmosphere is special and the room is decorated in a wonderfully classic art deco design.





PALAIS GARNIER (OPERA GARNIER)

Palais Garnier, thanks to a starring role in Gaston Leroux's 1910 novel The Phantom of the Opera, it's the most famous opera house in the world. Most ballet and opera performances in Paris are held at Palais Garnier since The Paris Opera Ballet, the oldest national ballet company, to which any European and international ballet companies can trace their origins, and Paris Opera are housed and perform at Palais Garnier. The architecture and décor of Palais Garnier are at least as dramatic as the performances it hosts. Built by Charles Garnier in the late 1800s during Haussmann's renovation of Paris, the opera house stands out as a superb example of the Napoleon III style. Drawing on an eclectic and extravagant mix of architectural influences, every inch of the Opéra is covered with elegant textures, one-of-a-kind artworks, and gold. The sight of the opéra's sublime ceiling created by Chagall will be one of the magical moments of your evening Walking into this exquisite opera house, you'll quickly get swept up in the luxury of it all, especially if you attend an opera or ballet.




LA COMÉDIE FRANÇAISE


Nestled in one of the prettiest parts of Paris, on the corner of the Palais–Royal and the famous terrace of the restaurant Le Nemours, this beautiful theater dates back to 1790, and since 1799, it's been home to the oldest active theater company in the world, La Comédie Française. This prestigious company, created by Louis XIV back in 1680, is the only French state theater to have a permanent acting troupe. Roughly 12 different pieces are performed each season, with daily performances from September to July.








THE FOLIES BERGÈRE




LE MARTA | COCKTAIL BAR


LES AMBASSADEURS | CHAMPAGNE BAR


HARRY'S BAR NEW YORK


THE NIGHT FLIGHT | COCKTAIL LOUNGE


SERPENT A PLUME | SPEAKEASY


LE CAVEAU DE LA HUCHETTE | JAZZ CLUB


FITZGERALD | BAR LOUNGE


LE MATIGNON | NIGHTCLUB


HÔTEL BOURBON | NIGHTCLUB

As the walls of the club beckon, so do its creative offerings – experimental film projections, DJ sets from the likes of Cerone or Cassius, and even concerts – beckoning one and all to a night of mystique and bliss.




NEW MORNING | MUSIC & PERFORMANCE VENUE







BASTILLE DAY

In France, Le Quatorze Juillet (Bastille Day, July 14) is celebrated with parades, fireworks and dances, but few of them take place at Place de la Bastille. The Bastille Day military parade, for instance, starts from the Arc de Triomphe, then follows a route along Champs-Elysées to Place de la Concorde. On Bastille Day evening, fireworks occur on and around the Eiffel Tower.



ROCK EN SEINE

Celebrating almost two decades and an unwavering crowd of faithfuls, the music festival Rock en Seine needs no introduction. More than 100,000 music lovers gather in the capital each year at the Parc National de Saint-Cloud to enjoy live concerts across the four stages. All styles of rock 'n roll genre are represented, from punk to metal, via pop-rock, new-wave and Britpop. Major international bands play here alongside some of the freshest talents of tomorrow. The festival has seen musicians and bands like Arctic Monkeys, Massive Attack, Cypress Hill and Oasis, Stromae, Nick Cave & The Bad Seeds, Tame Impala, Kraftwerk, to name a few.




LOLLAPALOOZA PARIS

Introduced in 1991 by Perry Farrell, lead singer of the rock band Jane's Addiction, Lollapalooza has quickly become a benchmark for American festivals. After a number of tours in North America, Lollapalooza came to France. This festival, considered one of the biggest in the world, takes place at the Hippodrome de Longchamp for two musical days that will satisfy festival–goers. An occasion for the French public and tourists to discover exceptional live performances of international artists such as The Strokes, Twenty One Pilots, Martin Garrix, Orelsan, and others.



THE CÉSAR AWARDS CEREMONY

A must-attend event for cinematic achievement, the César Awards ceremony has been rewarding the best of French cinema since 1976. It is an unmissable highlight on the French film industry calendar. It is nationally televised award ceremony held in Paris each year in February. More than four decades later, the ceremony is seen as a celebration of diversity in terms of its nominees and the subjects they tackle on the big screen. The César Award is considered the highest film honor in France – the French film industry's equivalent to the Molière Award for theater, and the Victoires de la Musique for music. The after event to the Césars Awards ceremony sees many cinema nobels for a sit-down dinner at Le Fouquet's, host to the César's after-show soirée.




PARIS FASHION WEEK

Even though the world's first 'fashion week' took place in New York in 1943, Paris still claims its throne as the world's style capital, with aficionados flocking en masse to its annual fashion weeks. The most desirable and significant event in the fashion industry is the final of the four most important fashion weeks in the world – fashion weeks in London, New York, and Milan. Unfortunately, only a few people can visit the shows — famous fashion designers, buyers, showbiz stars, and a separate media category. Head to runway sites like the Grand Palais or the Espace Eiffel and book a place in the fashion show of the current season.





One of the world's four grand slam tennis tournaments, Roland Garros is always in high demand. The highest-profile matches take place on the Philippe Chatrier court, although you can also catch some thrilling encounters, with a better view, on the Suzanne Lenglen and Simonne Mathieu courts.





Paris Pride, or the Marche des Fiertés, is one of the world's biggest and best celebrations of its sort. The carnival procession is joyous, there's a phenomenal concert line-up, and hundreds and hundreds of thousands turn up to march in defence of equal rights for the LGBTQI+ community each year. As the evening draws in, the party continues at clubs and bars throughout the capital.






Imported from Chicago, this eclectic music festival seems to get better every year. Spread over several stages and held in a former slaughterhouse, the Grande Halle, Pitchfork invites the cream of international pop, hip-hop and alternative rock to the capital. Past headliners have included everyone from Skepta and the National to M.I.A. and the Knife. If it's best new music, it'll probably be at Pitchfork.



PARIS MARATHON (MARATHON DE PARIS)

The Schneider Electric Marathon de Paris offers a unique opportunity to make the city yours by participating in one of the most prestigious races over the legendary 26 miles and 385 yards (42.195 kilometers) distance. The Schneider Electric Marathon de Paris is now one of the biggest marathons in the world, as much for the size of its field as performances of its runners. Each finisher goes home with incredible memories. Tens of thousands of runners tackle the most fabled long–distance discipline in athletics. This race, taking in the Champs Elysées, the Bois de Vincennes and Boulogne, offers an incomparable backdrop, with spectacular views and landmarks all along the route. The marathon combines personal challenge with the chance to discover one of the world's great cities.






THE ROLEX PARIS MASTERS

Ilie Năstase, Andre Agassi, Roger Federer, and Novak Djokovic are the only players to have ever won both Parisian tournaments (Bercy and the French Open).






SACRÉ-COEUR BASILICA (BASILIQUE DU SACRÉ-COEUR)

Work on this enormous mock Romano–Byzantine edifice began in 1877 and it was completed in 1914. It has become one of the best known Paris churches due to its prominent location and brilliant white color. It was commissioned after the nation's defeat by Prussia in 1870, voted for by the Assemblée Nationale and built from public subscription. The interior boasts lavish mosaics while the white stone used to build Sacre–Coeur has an amazing self–cleaning property. When it rains the stone release a white chalky substance that acts like a fresh coat of paint. There's no better view of Paris than from atop the steps of Sacre–Coeur. In fact, because it's built on the hill of Montmartre, it's the highest point in Paris (higher than the Eiffel Tower).




ARC DE TRIOMPHE

The Arc de Triomphe of the Place de l'Etoile is one of the most famous monuments in Paris. It is situated at the center of the Place Charles de Gaulle (initially Place de l'Étoile), at the beginning of the Champs-Élysées. The Arc de Triomphe honors those who fought and died for France during the French Revolution and the Napoleonic Wars, with the names of all French victories and generals inscribed on its inner and outer surfaces. Under its vault lies the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier from the First World War. The monument was designed by Jean Chalgrin in 1806 on the orders of Napoleon and inaugurated in 1836 for the sixth anniversary of the Three Glorious. Fifty meters high, 45 meters wide and 22 meters deep, it was the largest triumphal arch in the world before the construction of the one in Pyongyang in 1982. Its design was inspired by the Roman Arch of Titus.





The Eiffel Tower is an iron tower in the Champ de Mars. Its name comes from the engineer Gustave Eiffel. Built in 1889 for the International Exhibition, it has become a cultural icon of France and one of the most recognizable structures in the world. With more than 7 million visitors annually, it is the most visited, paid monument in the world. The Eiffel Tower has been a historical monument since June 24, 1964.



HÔTEL DES INVALIDES

Part of the Parisian skyline since the reign of Louis XIV, the Hôtel des Invalides can be seen from almost anywhere in Paris thanks to its immediately recognizable golden dome. Built in 1670 on the orders of Louis XIV to shelter sick, wounded, and retired veterans, the landmark still serves this purpose today, now also housing several museums, the offices of a few high-ranking military officials, and a military pantheon including Napoleon's tomb.




PALAIS ROYAL

Palais Royal is not easy to spot, surrounded as it is by other famous buildings and since it's now used for government offices. Or maybe it's because it's right across from the Louvre and visitors are distracted by the fame and beauty of the museum. But, hidden from the casual passerby are the wonderful gardens. Stroll through the galleries that border the garden, walk the flowery paths, and sit by one of the most pleasant fountains in the city. It's a relaxing break from the hustle and bustle surrounding the Louvre.



ÉGLISE ST-EUSTACHE CHURCH

Église St-Eustache in Paris is a highly unappreciated asset on the city's church scene. Gothic flying buttresses, rose windows, flamboyant vaulting, and a Renaissance facade rivaling that of Notre Dame – St-Eustache is truly a masterpiece of late Gothic architecture. It's was also considered a mecca for sacred music, with composers like Verdi, Liszt, and Berlioz choosing to play their compositions here to benefit from the spectacular acoustics. It took a long time to complete as it was built over a 100-year period between 1532-1632. Its gigantic church organ, with 8,000 pipes, is the largest in France.




PONT NEUF

It is quite ironic and puzzling that the oldest standing bridge in Paris should be called the Pont Neuf (new bridge). When constructed in the early 17th century, it was, of course, a new bridge, hence the name, but its precursors have long since been demolished. A span of five arches crosses the Seine from the Left Bank to the western end of the lle de la Cité, and another span of seven arches joins the island to the Right Bank. When completed in the early 17th century, the bridge was unusual in that it was the first in the city not to have houses built upon it. It was also fitted with pavements so pedestrians could be protected from the roadway filth and the hazards of passing horse–drawn carriages. The venerable bridge and the oldest surviving bridge in the city, the Pont Neuf is also, at 238 meters, the third longest.



SEINE RIVER

Running through the heart of Paris, the Seine is the best–known river in France. It flows from Dijon in the Alps to the English Channel at Le Havre. The Seine is both a major commercial river and a beautiful tourist attraction. Strolling along the banks or relaxing on a boat tour are lovely ways to view the city's monuments, historic buildings and ornate bridges. The two banks of the Seine offer their own distinct flavor of the Parisian experience. They are referred to as La Rive Gauche (the Left Bank) and a La Rive Droite (the Right Bank). Both banks are listed as UNESCO World Heritage Sites. The Left Bank has long been linked to writers, artists and café culture. The likes of Hemingway, Picasso and Matisse all once called La Rive Gauche their home. The Right Bank of the Seine, on the other hand, has always had stronger links with commerce and trade. La Rive Droite was traditionally the wealthier side of the Seine, though this is not entirely true in modern times.



THE CONCIERGERIE

The Conciergerie is a splendid gothic palace. This UNESCO World Heritage site is a stunning example of 13th century secular Gothic architecture. Aside from its spectacular soaring arches, vaulted ceilings, and immense spaces, the Conciergerie holds a special place history as the royal palace of the first French kings. The Kings of France abandoned the palace at the end of the 14th century to settle in the Louvre and Vincennes. It then took on a judicial role, and part of the palace was converted and served as a notorious Reign of Terror (La Terreur) prison during the French Revolution. Between 1793 and 1795 more than 4,000 people accused of threatening the newly-formed republic were judged and incarcerated here. Its most famous prisoner was Marie Antoinette who spent her final days awaiting execution. One more remarkable feature of this gothic building, at its northeast corner, is an ornate, gilded public clock that's been keeping time for Parisians since the 14th century.




SAINTE CHAPELLE

Famous for its dazzling medieval stained glass windows and candlelight concerts, Sainte Chapelle is another gothic gem on Île de la Cité. In a city filled with magnificent churches, the beauty of this small chapel built to house religious relics has no equal. The stained glass windows of Sainte Chapelle soar up to the heavens, where the ceiling is flecked with gold to resemble stars. The walls seem to disappear into nothingness, giving the place an otherworldly lightness. But perhaps the most impressive aspects of the church's interior are the stunning rose windows which date back to the mid-13th century and are among the largest in Europe at a diameter of 13 meters (a bit more than 40 feet).




THE NOTRE DAME CATHEDRAL

The Notre Dame Cathedral is absolutely a must-see monument. A medieval masterpiece of gothic architecture, the church is one of the most visited historical sites in all of Europe, and for a good reason. Built over the span of two centuries, from 1163 to the mid-14th century, Notre Dame de Paris is a magnificent study of French gothic architecture. Since construction took so long, the style of the cathedral isn't completely uniform, letting you discover architectural elements from different gothic periods. Highly ornamented flying buttresses and gargoyles adorn the exterior as exquisite examples of Rayonnant gothic architecture.




HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL (THE MÉMORIAL DE LA SHOAH)

Europe's largest center for information on the Holocaust, the Paris Holocaust Memorial educates visitors to fight against racism and intolerance. It was Inaugurated in 2005 by French President Jacques Chirac and celebrated French politician and Holocaust survivor Simone Veil. The Mémorial de la Shoah was created with one purpose: understanding the past to illuminate the future.



THE PANTHEON

The Pantheon is a building in the Latin Quarter. It was originally built as a church to house the reliquary of St. Genevieve but after many changes, it is now hosting a secular mausoleum, housing the ashes of prominent French citizens. Built in the 18th century by Jacques-Germain Soufflot, the Pantheon is a monument of neo-classical style, with a facade similar to the Pantheon in Rome. This is the final resting place for Jean-Jacques Rousseau, Voltaire and Jacques-Germain Soufflot, Jean Moulin, André Malraux, Jean Monnet, Pierre Curie, Victor Hugo, Alexandre Dumas, Emile Zola, Jean Jaures, and Marie Curie.



PLACE DE LA CONTRESCARPE

Place de la Contrescarpe is not to be missed if you find yourself in the 5th Arrondissement, also known as the Latin Quarter. The Place de la Contrescarpe is a lively little square surrounded by charming cafés, restaurants, and little souvenir shops. It's a meeting point and an old stomping ground for literary greats like Hemingway, who mentions the place in *The Sun Also Rises*. James Joyce and George Orwell all lived and wrote here. This is where Joyce finished *Ulysses* and the neighborhood Orwell wrote about in *Down And Out In Paris And London*. Even the walls here are literary. This wall, on Rue Descartes, is decorated with poet–tree. The poem says, "Philosopher, do you have the chance to have a tree in your street?"



GREAT MOSQUE OF PARIS (LA GRANDE MOSQUÉE DE PARIS)

Under its green roofs, between its high, white exterior walls, the Great Mosque of Paris provides one of the largest spaces in France for the practice of Islam. Built from 1922–1926 in the wake of World War I, the Neo Spanish–Moorish style mosque sits on nearly three acres in the Quartier Latin. With beautiful patios, gardens, and prayer rooms as well as a tearoom, restaurant, and hammam covered with Moorish–style mosaics, this place of worship also warmly welcomes tourists and visitors of all origins and religions coming to discover the richness of Muslim art and civilization. The place is perfect if you just want to relax, sip on a mint tea or taste traditional Arab cuisine, snacking on authentic Arab pastries among the olive trees in the charming Moroccan courtyard.




CHÂTEAU OF VINCENNES (CHÂTEAU DE VINCENNES)

The Chateau de Vincennes was used as royal residence from the 12th to 18th centuries and it has preserved its medieval towers, the Sainte-Chapelle and the 14th century keep which is the highest of its kind in Europe. In 1365, Charles V, King of France, transformed the family manor house at Vincennes into a more suitable royal dwelling and built the present keep to house his art collection and manuscripts. However, as of the early 15th century through to the 1800s, the castle keep was used as a prison, a symbol of absolute State power. Prisoners such as the Marquis de Sade, Nicholas Fouquet, former owner of Château Vaux le Vicomte, the forerunner of Versailles, and philosopher Denis Diderot, were all incarcerated within the château's sturdy walls.








In the hip northwestern neighborhood of Batignolles, this little oasis sits behind a church and beside railroad tracks. The English garden is peaceful, perhaps surprisingly so for its location. Beautiful green lawns, a pond, and a small stream running through the square make this a popular place for locals to enjoy lunch on a nice day before returning to work.



PARC MONCEAU

This park is as elegant as the neighborhood surrounding it. Perhaps the most romantic park in the city, the Parc Monceau differs from other Parisian parks with its informal English garden style. The pond, classical colonnade, and statues throughout the garden make this a charming spot for a stroll or a lunch. With a playground and pony rides, children are sure to love it too. Located in the 8th Arrondissement, the park's main entrance on Boulevard Courcelles has a lovely rotunda, once part of one of the old city walls. The park's most noteworthy feature, however, lies just past the rotunda. A truly ethereal endroit, a tranquil pond bordered by Corinthian columns, awaits.






Significantly smaller than the famous Père Lachaise or Montmartre cemeteries, Passy's little graveyard is very much atmospheric. Views of the Trocadéro and the Eiffel Tower add to the enchantment of this cemetery, whose grandiose art deco-style entrance belies its relatively young age. Although not exactly studded with famous names, here lie the remains of composer Claude Debussy, perfumer Jacques Guerlain, fashion designer Hubert de Givenchy, and painter Edouard Manet.




TUILERIES GARDENS (JARDIN DES TUILERIES)

Jardin des Tuileries in Paris, the splendid public garden between the Louvre and Place de la Concorde, takes center stage as the place to meet, play, and relax. As you stroll through the sun-dappled pathways, it's hard to imagine this was ground zero for the French Revolution and the official residence of French kings and queens. Perhaps the most famous garden in Paris, the Jardin des Tuileries is a lush haven offering great views of the Louvre Museum. The historic park was created by Catherine de Medici in 1564, but it didn't take on its current French formal garden style until 1664 when it was redesigned on the orders of King Louis XIV. If you've never visited, it should certainly make the itinerary. Right after perusing the wonders of the Louvre, cross over from the pyramid and go for a placid stroll among the fountains and flowers. Though the highly trafficked Rue de Rivoli runs alongside the garden, you'll find the Tuileries to offer a welcome respite from the city proper. The impressive park is stunning too, decorated with classic statues and lined with trees, blooms, and greenery where you can lie on the grass and read a book.




LUXEMBOURG GARDEN (JARDIN DU LUXEMBOURG)

Often overshadowed by the famed Tuileries Gardens, the Jardin du Luxembourg is a Parisian favorite. Nicknamed "Luco" by residents. If you appreciate architecture, check out the beautiful Medici Fountain and the impressive Palace of Luxembourg (home to the senate), built by Marie de Medici in the 1600s. The Orangerie in the park is home to more than 180 different plants, and the greenhouses showcase more than 400 orchid species. Children will have a great time playing in the enormous playground with all sorts of slides and swings. Or, to engage in a more traditional Parisian childhood activity, they could rent a toy sailboat and guide it around the park's main pond.




LA PROMENADE PLANTÉE (OR COULÉE VERTE)

La Coulée Verte, also called La Promenade Plantée, is a nearly three-mile-long path along an abandoned railway track taking you from Bastille out to the nearby suburb of Vincennes. Opened in 1993, Paris's linear park served as the inspiration for New York's High Line, which wasn't inaugurated until 2009. The track starts just behind the Opéra Bastille, up on top of the Viaduc des Arts. A discreet staircase on the corner of the red brick archways leads up to this atypical park.



PÈRE LACHAISE

Perched atop a hill in the 20th Arrondissement, Père Lachaise is the most-visited cemetery in the world. More than three million visitors come here each year to stroll through the peaceful cimetière and see the graves of famous French and foreign artists. Known today as the final resting place of Jim Morrison, Oscar Wilde, Honoré de Balzac, Eugène Delacroix, and Edith Piaf, Père Lachaise wasn't always considered a prestigious place to be buried when the cemetery first opened in 1804.





CHRISTMAS MARKETS

Paris is a show-stopper city at any time of year, but come winter, it takes on a new, heartwarming persona as the air becomes filled with the smell of spiced sweets and vin chaud (mulled wine), which drifts across from the many Christmas markets. With crisp winter sunshine illuminating landmarks like Notre Dame, the Eiffel Tower, the Louvre, and many more. Christmas-selling trinkets and snacks adorn almost every arrondissement – in typically chic style. Many are set around or nearby various iconic attractions, and here are the finest Christmas markets.



LA MAGIE DE NOËL, TUILERIES GARDEN

This market is sprawled across the vast green space of Tuileries Garden. There are about 100 stalls selling every Christmas trinket imaginable, with plenty winter delicacies: roasted chestnuts, mulled wine, an ice rink, a towering Christmas tree and even a full fair ground with elaborately decorated carousels.



LA DÉFENSE CHRISTMAS MARKET

Christmas at this market is in one of the city's main business districts. Slick skyscrapers and arty, angular office buildings make the backdrop, but thanks to some very stylish decorating, it looks and feels remarkably festive. The sheer size (with about 350 chalets, it's one of largest markets) also means there's an incredible variety of products on offer, from toys to jewelry to decorations to non–Christmas items. There's also a large ice rink where you can burn off calories from all the food you sampled at all the food stalls.



MARCHÉ DE NOËL, NOTRE DAME

Since it's set in the shadow of Notre Dame Cathedral, why not combine a visit to this market with a jaunt around the mighty gothic masterpiece? For extra sightseeing points, you can also take a look at the oldest tree in Paris, dating back to the 17th century and sits on the edge of Square René Viviani, where the market is held. The market itself is small and pretty, and the many artisan maker stalls mean it's a great bet for arts and crafts of all kinds, such as mosaics, stationery, and raku (a type of Japanese pottery).



SAINT-GERMAIN-DES-PRÉS CHRISTMAS MARKET

A neighborhood as artsy as Saint-Germain-des-Prés could only ever host a super-stylish market, and this one lives up to expectations. Many of the 20–30 chalets stock high-end gifts and luxury-leaning items, but the main draw for many visitors is the fashion, with items from local and international designers on sale (mirroring the many clothing stores around the area) alongside all the usual festive staples. Food and drink here is also a more upscale, so if you fancy swapping your vin chaud for champagne and artisan chocolate, now's your chance.








PARC ASTÉRIX


CITY OF SCIENCES AND INDUSTRY (PARIS'S CITÉ DES SCIENCES ET DE L'INDUSTRIE)

Paris Science City is the largest science museum in Europe. Set in the vast Parc de la Villette in the northeast of the 19th Arrondissement, the museum is housed in an enormous modern building incorporating all sorts of fun for curious activities for children and adults. Inside the City of Sciences and Industry, permanent and temporary exhibitions teach you anything and everything about the human body, transportation, science, mathematics, robots, and so much more. Cité des Sciences makes for a great family outing. If you're in Paris with teens, there's also a small shopping mall attached to the museum which has some nice boutiques and offers indoor skydiving! And if that's not enough to keep the teens entertained, spend some time in the on-site aquarium, planetarium, or IMAX theater housed in a round, mirrored building called La Géode.



PALACE OF DISCOVERY (PALAIS DE LA DÉCOUVERTE)

There's nothing like an amazing building filled with remarkable things to keep both parents and children happy. Housed in the west wing of Le Grand Palais and dating back to 1897, the Palais de la Découverte was converted into a museum in 1937 by the Nobel-Prize-winning physicist Jean Baptiste Perrin. this lesser-known museum combines history, glamorous architecture, and science. Brimming with interactive exhibits on chemistry, mathematics, biology, and astronomy, this science museum features a pi room, optical illusions, puzzles to solve, buttons to press, and discoveries to be made. Most exhibits have English translations, and the very few that don't are still intriguing.



MUSEUM OF HUMANITY (THE MUSÉE DE L'HOMME)

This museum is placed in the northern wing of the Palais de Chaillot on Trocadero overlooking the Eiffel Tower. Wandering through this enormous space is enlightening. It brings together innumerable pieces to tell the story of mankind including both progress and downfalls. Working hand-in-hand with the National Museum of Natural History in the Jardin des Plantes, this museum takes you on a journey of humanity's evolution. It highlights differences and similarities, reminding us that, in the end, we are all human. Temporary exhibitions also reinforce this message. All in all, the Musée de l'Homme is an untraditional museum offering incredible views and thought-provoking exhibits. It's a place to slow down and learn something, and it's a great museum to explore with children of all ages.




THE BALLON GENERALI (BALLON DE PARIS)

Why not take the family for a thrilling balloon lift-off? Drift up in this helium-filled balloon in Parc André Citroën that remains tethered to the ground as it lifts you 150 meters into the air for spectacular panoramas. The balloon plays an active environmental role, changing color depending on air quality and pollution levels. The Ballon Generali has been in Paris since 1999. It was created and developed by the French company Aerophile SAS to celebrate the year 2000.



THE HERBE MUSEUM (MUSÉE EN HERBE)

Exhibitions at the Musée en Herbe change regularly and have recently included works by the Parisian street artist Invader, as well as examples of famous artworks discovered through play. All exhibitions are geared toward children but are also fun for adults as they teach you to look at art in a new, more playful way. With just four small rooms, the museum makes it easy to keep children's attention. You receive a small booklet with challenges to complete during your visit – great enjoyment for young and old.



INVADER HUNTING ON THE STREETS OF PARIS

If you're on a family trip, this is the perfect way to keep the children excited, interested, and occupied. Combining street art, video games, and scavenger hunts, this activity will surely please the young and the young at heart. To date, world-renowned Parisian street artist Invader has placed some 1,400 (and counting) tiled creatures called Invaders (inspired by the arcade game, Space Invaders) across the city, often on street corners above the street names, others on empty walls, or even on the pavement. You can download the app called FlashInvaders, allowing you to create a gallery of the pieces of art discovered, pushing you to see the city in a different way. Street art Invaders can be found by the Louvre, the Eiffel Tower, the Trocadero, the lle de la Cité, around Le Marais, and the list goes on. So you can take your time looking at the sights while your children search for Invaders.



FAIRGROUND ARTS MUSEUM (MUSÉE DES ARTS FORAINS)

This singular, and wonderfully unconventional hidden gem is right around the corner from Bercy Village in the 12th Arrondissement. Residing in former wine storage warehouses, guests are transported back to 19th and early 20th century fairgrounds while walking through grandiose rooms filled with original carrousels, fairground games, costumes, and oddities.
